SHIPMENT OF ORE FROM STEWART MINE

Twenty Tons of High Grade goes South from L. & L. Glacier Creek to Selby

STEWART, Aug. 26. - The first real shipment of ore from the L. & L. Glacier Creek mine to the smelter at Selby, California, was made last week from Stewart. Twenty tons went south on the Anyox. This was high grade and is expected to go about \$200 to the ton in silver, lead; and zinc.

Ore is coming down now at the rate of something over a ton a day and manager Breeze intimated that regular shipments will be made from now on as long as weather conditions allow. The ore has to be packed 4 1/2 miles from the mine to the wagon road and then hauled by ruck to the dock at Stewart.
