Everybody Busy

At this season of the year boats of the fishing fleets, comprising halibut boats, trollers and seiners are practically all out garnering in the harvest of the deep, and few boats are at present in port. Cow Bay and vicinity is almost depleted of floating craft and but for a few in the Naas river and Smith's Inlet and other boats in port let districts the run at Dundas undergoing delayed repairs there is little activity at tidewater.

Halibut arrivals have been up to the average for this time of the year and good weather is reported to have existed on the deep sea fishing grounds although rain has been frequent. Fine Yacht In

One of the snappiest looking private yachts to put into port for some time past arrived on Wednesday afternoon when the power yacht Alcian, owned by Mr. Wiley, who is connected with the Todd shipyards, Seattle, came to anchor opposite the Prince Rupert Boat House. The yacht has been on a pleasure cruise to Alaskan points. The Alcian put into port to enable her owner to despatch some telegrams and take on supplies before continuing south early yesterday morning. The Alcian is 119 feet long with a 20 foot beam and is powered with twin 150 horse power Winton diesel engines. The interior of the craft is beautifully appointed and embodies all the latest conveniences. Part of the ship's equipment is wireless and radio. Many fine concerts having been enjoyed throughout the trip on the latter.

Alex. Holmes of Anyox is having his power boat Esprit remodelled at the Suga yards. The craft is being transformed into a trolling boat which will be powered with a 12 h.p. Regal engine. Many fine concerts having been enjoyed throughout the trip on the latter.

Fire Averted

The United Church mission boat Crosby, a 54 foot craft skippered by Capt. Oliver, came near to being destroyed by fire while at Oceanic on Monday last, and it was only due to the hard fire fighting work of the skipper and Dr. Spencer that a serious conflagration was averted.

So serious did things look at one time that preparations were quickly made to tow the craft out to sea to protect other boats in the vicinity. A spark jumped from the electrical wires and fell upon a piece of oily waste which ignited.

The skipper grabbed the waste and in an effort to throw it out of a closed porthole, it fell upon the gasoline pump.

The flames quickly spread through the engine room and before the fire was finally got under the heat had melted the spout off a two gallon priming can. However, after a strenuous battle between the Pyrene fire extinguisher and the fire, the former won. But for the wood of the interior of the craft being scorched little damage was done.
