**NEARLY WENT
OVER NIAGARA**
Two Men Are Rescued After
Thrilling Experience Near
Huge Cataract
NIAGARA FALLS, Jan. 4.—
Saving themselves by a narrow
margin from going over the cat-
aract, and rescued later from a
crib in the river on which they
were waroaned for several hours,
Arthur Makin and Glavin Berner
of Echota are congratulating
themselves that they suffered no
worse injury than that Makin's
feet were slightly frostbitten.
The two men were brought to land
after one of the most thrilling
rescues seen here for a long
time.
Makin and Berner rented a
rowboat and started for Navy
Island. The boat had two pairs
of oars, but one pair was broken
by the force of the current as
the men neared the Canadian side
of the river. They were in dan-
ger of the cataract. With the
single pair of oars Makin man-
aged to row the boat by inches
out of the Canadian channel
and into the United States chan-
nel. When within about 200 feet
of one of the cribs jutting out
from the Niagara Falls Power
Co.'s plant a third oar broke.
Withoutly one oar Makin used
it to scull the boat nearer the
crib and when about six feet

**BOOTLEG BARONET

LONDON, Jan. 4.—The rum-
running baronet, Col. Sir Broder-
ick Hartwell, is bankrupt. A re-
ceiving order in bankruptcy
against him was published in the
London Gazette.

extended him credit for shipping
and other expenses, are hard hit.

owing to bad luck and promised
more precautions and likelier di-
vidends next time.

**SYNOPSIS OF
LAND ACT AMENDMENTS**
PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed
Crown lands may be pre-empted by
British subjects over 18 years of age,
and by aliens on declaring intention
to become British subjects, condi-
tional upon residence, occupation,
and improvement for agricultural
purposes.
Full information concerning regu-
lations regarding pre-emptions is
given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series,
"How to Pre-empt Land," copies of
which can be obtained free of charge
by addressing the Department of
Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov-
ernment Agent.
Records will be granted covering
only land suitable for agricultural
purposes, and which is not timber-
land, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board
feet per acre west of the Coast Range
and 5,000 feet per acre east of that
Range.
Applications for pre-emptions are
to be addressed to the Land Com-
missioner of the Land Recording Di-
vision, in which the land applied for
is situated, and are made on printed
forms, copies of which can be ob-
tained from the Land Commissioner.
Pre-emptions must be occupied for
five years and improvements made
to value of \$10 per acre, including
clearing and cultivating at least five
acres, before a Crown Grant can be
received.

the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt
Land."
PURCHASE
Applications are received for pur-
chase of vacant and unreserved
Crown lands, not being timberland,
for agricultural purposes; minimum
price for first-class (arable) land is
\$5 per acre, and second-class (graz-
ing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further in-
formation regarding purchase or lease
of Crown lands is given in Bulletin
No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and
Lease of Crown Lands."
Mill, factory, or industrial sites on
timber land, not exceeding 40 acres,
may be purchased or leased, the con-
ditions including payment of
stampage.
HOMESITE LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20
acres, may be leased as homesites,
conditional upon a dwelling being
erected in the first year, title being
obtainable after residence and im-
provement conditions are fulfilled
and land has been surveyed.
LEASES
For grazing and industrial pur-
poses areas not exceeding 640 acres
may be leased by one person or a
company.
GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Provin-
ce is divided into grazing districts
and the ranges administered under a
Grazing Commissioner. Annual
grazing permits are issued based on
numbers ranged, priority being given
to established owners. Stock-owners
may form applications for range
management. Free, or partly free,
permits are available for settlers,
campers and travellers, up to ten
head.
