Captain Hanson Acquitted on Charge of Stealing \$4,000 is Today a Free Man Once More

Hegbert Arthur Hanson, charged with the theft on July 23 of \$4,000, being the property of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Ltd., was acquitted by the jury this morning at the session of. the Supreme Court Assizes before Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald. The jury retired at 5.45 last evening to consider its verdict and returned to the court room at 9.20 stating that it had been unable to reach a verdict. His Lordship asked the jury to make another effort to agree and adjourned the court until ten o'clock this morning, orderling the sheriff to take charge of them for the night. This morn-

Dr. J. D. McLean, Minister of Finance, Urges Appointments be of Only Men Who Can Do Work

VANCOUVER, November 13 .- In an address at the meeting of the Vancouver City Liberal Association here last night, Hon. J. D. McLean, minister of finance and provincial secretary, touched on the question of party patronage and stated that the qualification of a person for office must first be his ability to do the work. He did not believe in making positions for anyone.

The minister said it did not follow that all appointed should be Liberals for it was possible for a party to degenerate by becoming a machine. This was one of the greatest causes contributing to the

defeat of the Bowser government. "I .-believe the best government and best administration is secured when surrounded by those sympathetic to its aim and FIRATES TOOK objects," he said. Dr. McLean urged immediate organi-

HONG KONG, Nov. 13 .- Twenty-six pirates boarded the French steamer Hance at Kwang Chou Wan south of here. They killed the guard, ransacked the steamer, robbed the passengers and then abandoned the ship taking \$50,000 worth of bullion and \$20,000 in loot from the passengers and large quantities of guns, ammunition and builion shiped from the Maritime customs at Pak-101 to the Hong Kong bank.

JAPANESE VESSEL TO BE REPAIRED AT VANCOUVER AT COST OF ABOUT \$300,000

VANCOUVER, Nov. 13. - Competing against the leading shipbuilding firms of the Pacific Coast, the Burrard Drydock Company Limited (Wallace's) was today awarded the contract for repairing the Kaikyu Maru, which was wrecked in Johnstone Strait on August 27. The work on the ship is expected to take four months and will commence immediately. Before the ship is drydocked it will be necessary to remove two engines and several boilers. The rocks of Helmcken Island tore the bottom from stem to stern and the bulk of the repairs are beneath the engine room.
