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

Former Korean Commander Forecasts ing, undaunted Yankee Armistice-But Doesn't Know Why

VANCOUVER (9-Maj.-Gen. A. J. H. Cassels thinks there will be an armistice in Korea in six or nine months-but he

It isn't for security reasons that he couldn't say why, the former commander of Commonweath troops told reporters in an interview here.

"I have a hunch there will be a Korean armistice within six to nine months," he said. "Why, I don't know."
