## DEASE COUNTRY LOOKING GOOD

Day of Big Operation Instead of Small is Now at Hand, Says Resident Engineer.

FINE TRANSPORTATION SERVICE BEING GIVEN Muddy River Section Gives Promise of Containing Some Rich Ground.

On Gold Pan Creek, the scene of the 1925 stampede, there are now only three hand operators, but more gold will be taken out this year than there was last, states G. A. Clothier, resident mining engineer, who returned to the city yesterday after spending a month in the Dease Lake region on his annual inspection trip. While he does not believe there is anything sensational in the way of mineral wealth in this particular region, Mr. Clothier states that experienced men will probably be able to make good wages. The outfits now there are doing well.

Speaking of the Dease Lake region as a whole, Mr. Clothier is of the opinion that it will gradually come to the front now that transportation will allow the operators to come in. The district looks as if it should turn out to be a hydraulicking country. The best ground having all been gone over by hand operators, the day of small operation is now over, but there is a good chance for big operation, there being plenty of ground on the benches.

Within the last three years there have been several hydraulicking and drag line scraper operations started in the district. Five companies are now operating on McDames Creek and all have a good chance for success, Mr. Clothier states. On Thibert Creek at Porter's Landing on the lower or far end of Dease Lake, two outfits are operating, and on Dease Creek at Laketon, about half way down Dease Lake, there

are four or five more operations. Good Transportation Mr. Clothier, who went as far as McDames Creek, which is about 100 miles past Porter's Landing down the Dease River, was surprised at the great improvement in transportation facilities during the past three years.

There is a really splendid river boat service by the Harrington Transportation Co. from Wrangell to Telegraph Creek and from Telegraph Creek to Dease Lake, a distance of 73 miles, there is a wagon road fifty miles of which is in good condition and quite fit for all manner of traffic including motor cars. Motor trucks now make the 773 miles trip from Telegraph Creek to Dease Lake in from 10 to 12 hours. From Dease Lake landing, at the upper end of the lake, Harper Reed is running a small gas scow

down the 25 mile length of Dease Lake and then down the Dease River past McDames to the confluence with the Liard River. This is in addition to the Hudson Bay boats and scows which also ply down the Dease River. That the district is now supplied with a rapid transportation service is proved by the fact that Mr. Clothier himself made the trip from Gold Pan to Wrangell in 28 hours when coming out. Of course, it takes longer to go up when the boats are bucking the Stikine River instead of going with it.

Muddy River Country There are now a number of prospectors in the Muddy River country, forty miles east of Gold Pan, and there seems to be a good chance of some good placer ground being found says Mr. Clothier. The conditions and formations are favorable and all that is needed is thorough prospecting which the district is now getting. It is an easy country to get into, Mr. Clothier says, being equipped with good trails.

shipping men on account of the fact that their boats will not be delayed whilst loading. Berth Three Ships

The elevator has 129 bins of various sizes. This will enable the superintendent to handle the house to the fullest capacity as it will give him ample storage space for all grades. There is 1,040 feet of dock, and on account of the fact that the elevator has nineteen loading spouts, this will enable us to berth three vessels of average loading at one time if necessary.

The people of Prince Rupert are very enthusiastic about the Pool taking over their plant, and are going to give us every support that they possibly can. The project has tremendous possibilities. We have already arranged with tramp vessels to load grain at Prince Rupert at a very nominal freight rate over and above that from Vancouver for U. K. and European ports. It is my belief that Oriental lines will really see the advantage of the gain in time of sailing, and that their rates will be less than that to Vancouver.

The trackage from Edmonton to Prince Rupert is in very good condition, with the exception of a little ballasting, and on account of the favorable grade a good many more cars can be hauled than on the C. N. R. line to Vancouver under the same motive power.

Pioneering Movement The whole project undoubtedly has good possibilities, and it will be a rather interesting development in the building up of our Pool to know that we are pioneering a new movement of grain through a new port.

President H. W. Wood will leave for Australia via the Orient on the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Asia, sailing from Vancouver on July 22.

Mr. Wood will be accompanied through the Orient by George McIvor, western sales manager of the Canadian Pool, who will assist Mr. Wood in a survey of market conditions in the Far East. In the past few years the Far Eastern market has grown to astonishing proportions, with all indications pointing to a much greater increase in this trade for the future. It is confidently expected this trip will bring very tangible results in augmented sales for the Pool.

After spending about a month travelling through Japan and China, Mr. Wood will sail from Hong Kong on August 7, on the Eastern and Australian liner Tandu, arriving in Sydney on September 19.

Mr. Wood is representing the Alberta Pool in the study of the Wheat Pool situation in Australia. The Manitoba Pool is sending Colin Burnell and the Saskatchewan Pool is being represented by S. W. Robertson.
