Arrangements Being Made Take in Reformed Episcopal Congregations

MONTREAL, June 14. - (By anadian Press .- Reporting on he possibility of further church unions, under the auspices of the United Church of Canada. the Negotiations' Committee of that body at the General Council here reviewed the work of the year in that direction. The report stated that "the way has not opened for any further communication with the Church of England, it having been left with the Most Reverend Archbishop Matheson to fix a date for furher discussion." Negotiations with the Reformed Episcopal Church were, however, reported as being well advanced.

other communions relative to union has proceeded on the assumption that the United Church of Canada was essentially funiting as well as a United Church. Its contacts with other groups during the year have been in the direction of forming church relationships along national lines.
