

The Daily News extends greetings to Premier Arthur Meighen which was badly damaged by fire and hopes he will have a very enjoyable time in Prince Rupert. If, by any error of judgment on the part of the electorate, he should happen to secure a majority of supporters in the House of Commons, it will be a good thing for him to have been here and seen what a fine little town we have made here with the scorched. aid of the Liberal Government. Possibly he too may be able to help us. If, as seems probable, Mr. Meighen is again in opposition in the next Parliament, he will know something about the place which will be forging ahead and of which he will read or hear from time to time.

Steamships Bring 2,100 to Canada From Europe This Week-End.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14. - New settlers and returning tourists to the number of twenty-one hun-i dred will arrive at Quebec and Halifax over the week-end, acconding to advices received by the Canadian National Railways, and special trains from these ports to Montreal and Winnipeg will carry the passengers to their destinations.

The Letitia of the Anchor Donaldson Line is due to arrive in Quebec either tonight or Sunday morning with 730 passengers. The majority of these are new settlers, including a Canadian National Railways immigration par-

ty. These are destined for western Canadian points and the farming areas of Ontario. The Cunarder Antonia has 350 tourists. land is due in Quebec Sunday.

Four boats are due at Halifax

over the week-end. The Whitel Star liner Baltic with 434 pas-\$6.00 sengers and the Oscar II of the Scandinavian America Line will reach the Atlantic port on Sunday. The Stockholm of the Swedish American Line arrives on Monday with 170 passengers, while the French Line Labourdonnais docks at Halifax on Tuesday with 416 passengers. The majority of these are settlers from European countries and are destined for western Canada.




