The premises must be kept well ventilated and airy; the beer-drawing apparatus must be kept immaculately clean. Stools, rooms and ice boxes must be sanitary in every respect, and glasses must be thoroughly washed and dried each time they are used. All beer must be kept and served at the correct temperature.
