TOKYO ()-Three ships with 24 fishermen are missing after tidal waves and high winds buffeted the shores of Hokkaido Island today.

Nine of the fishermen were feared drowned when their ships overturned. Fifteen others are believed adrift on the Pacific.

Eighty houses and 23 fishing vessels were damaged. Tidal waves were about 12 feet high.

Winds and waves were the result of a typhoon that passed between Honshu and Hokkaido Islands.
