JAMES KERR, WELL KNOWN TRAVELLER DIES IN VICTORIA

Was Representative of Tuckett's Cigars and Tobaccos and Was Taken Ill Here About a Month Ago

Many local acquaintances of deceased, who are well known in this city and district as traveller for Tuckett's cigars and tobaccos, will regret to learn of the death of James Kerr which took place in the Royal Jubilee Hospital, Victoria, on Saturday morning last. The late Mr. Kerr was born in Glasgow, Scotland, and was thirty nine years of age. He had been a resident of Victoria for fourteen years and is survived by a widow and three children residing at 1117 Princess Avenue in that city.

Deceased paid his last visit here about a month ago. He came north on the gasoline cruiser Pride of the West and, being stricken with an attack of influenza, was obliged to enter hospital here. Later he returned to his home in Victoria but failed to recover from the illness.
