ists of the province, was set forth by G. W. Robertson, secretary, in an address recently before the Regina Board of Trade.

Today there are 100,000 farmers in Saskatchewan, chiefly interested in grain production, and of this number 72,479 belonged to the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool on April 30, 1926.

The membership, he said, continues to increase and soon the pool would represent 75 per cent of the province's agricultural community, and 75 per cent of the land. The present membership represented the handling of grain from thirteen million acres.

Charges had been made that the wheat pool was a socialistic organization—to help only the agricultural interests of the province—but in his address Mr. Robertson stressed the importance of having the goodwill and co-operation of all businessmen—this was necessary in the successful operation of a co-operative organization.

Building new markets, and the development of new uses for grain, were two of the paramount objects sought by pool officials, Mr. Robertson said. The pool was sought to "preserve for the growers and the public their profits and economies."

Stabilization of grain prices is now possible, and the members of the pool can now be assured that a good crop would bring them some reward. Every interest in the province has benefited through the operation of the pool, concluded Mr. Robertson.

## RINGLEADERS ALL SURRENDER

Give Themselves up Following Visit Paid by Police Squad, and are in Jail

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 28.—(By Canadian Press.)—How a posse of 20 men, headed by a local police inspector, invaded a community of 1,000 and secured the ringleaders of a gang of 80 which had recently marched on Harbor Grace, a neighboring village, beaten up the Government's Poor Relief Officer, Alexander Squires, father of Sir Richard Squires, a former premier of the Dominion, ransacked his office and terrorized the countryside generally, was told with the arrival here of the alleged culprits in charge of their captors.

### Consternation

While there is a certain amount of destitution in the outports during the winter months, calling for relief by the government, Newfoundland is rarely called upon to deal with a situation precipitated by direct action. The news that a considerable portion of the able-bodied male population of Upper Island Cove had invaded the neighboring village of Harbor Grace, demanding food, and on being refused had committed depredations, was received with something akin to consternation. But response to the challenge made against constituted authority was prompt. A special train was immediately made up and a police inspector heading a squad of four or five police officers was despatched to the scene. This force was augmented en route and by the time Upper Island Cove was reached the expedition had grown to 20 men.

### Surrender Made

The officers of the law were met on the outskirts of the village by the fomenters of the trouble and a palaver ensued. The villagers were given 48 hours in which to deliver up the ringleaders. The police then retired to Harbor Grace. Well within the time limit set four men trudged over the ridge separating the two communities, crossed the harbor by ferry and surrendered. They were immediately brought to St. John's and are now in jail here awaiting trial.

The residents of Upper Island Cove received \$19,000 in relief during the winter of 1925. They received relief fortnightly throughout the past winter. On April 29, 140 families received the usual relief. It was following this distribution that a visit was paid to Harbor Grace and upon the relieving officer refusing to hand out additional supplies that the depredations occurred.

## MANITOBA SEEKING TO GET ITS RESOURCES

Premier Bracken Plans Early Trip to Ottawa

WINNIPEG, May 28.—The Provincial Premier, John Bracken plans to visit Ottawa shortly and discuss with the Federal Government Officials the matter of turning over control of the natural resources of Manitoba to the provincial government. At present jurisdiction of these resources is vested in the Dominion government, the province receiving an annual sum in lieu of actual control.

The Premier also will take up other provincial questions with the federal authorities. He will support the plea of a delegation which is now in the capital regarding soldier settlement lands, advocating that the Soldiers' Settlement Board pay arrears of taxes on land which has reverted to it. The Premier also will press the matter of controlling companies selling stock and

securities, and will seek to obtain authority from the Government for the Province to deal with companies doing such business within its boundaries.

## 100,000 MUSKRAT PELTS ARE TAKEN

THE PAS, May 28.—With the spring muskrat season over, traders and trappers are fast returning from their trapping grounds with their catches. It is estimated that the total catch will run about 100,000 taken from the swamps of the Saskatchewan river, basin tributary to The Pas. With the prevailing price, more than \$150,000 will be the net proceeds from this industry for the past season.
