Pretty Ceremony of Much Local Interest Took Place in Kerrisdale Church Last Evening

(Special to Daily News) VANCOUVER, May 5.—St. Mary's Church, Kerrisdale, was beautifully decorated with dog-wood, tulips and other spring flowers and foliage for the wedding of Miss Phyllis Vera Ray, youngest daughter of the late W. J. Ray and Mrs. A. Hunter Ray of Cheshire, England, to Alexander Gillespie Rix, only son of Archdeacon G. A. Rix, administrator of the diocese of Caledonia, and Mrs. Rix, which took place last evening. The ceremony was performed by Venerable Archdeacon Rix, father of the groom, assisted by Rev. C. S. McGaffin, rector of St. Mary's.

The service was fully choral, the bride having been a member of the choir of St. Mary's for six years. The bridal march was played by Mrs. A. Adamson and Mrs. Richmond sang "God Touched the Rose" during the signing of the register.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her brother-in-law, Dr. Neil McNeil, was lovely in a gown of ivory charmeuse satin, of picturesque medieval design, with low waistline and ruffled skirt with inserts of Venetian lace medallions surrounded by seed pearls. Her veil was of Brussels net hand embroidered with sprays and seed pearls. A wreath of orange blossoms held the veil in place. She carried a shower bouquet of Ophelia roses and lilies-of-the-valley and also a lovely gray suede prayer book, the presentation of the Chancel Guild. She also wore the gift of the groom, a gold engraved bracelet.

JUNIOR SOCCER LEAGUE FORMED

Organization Meeting Held Last Night—Season Will Open on May 12

At a meeting held last night in the city police court, the Junior Football League, which will be operated by the schools in conjunction with the Prince Rupert Football Association represented by Jack Campbell, W. E. Willis-Croft and George Cochrane, was reorganized. The meeting was in charge of J. S. Wilson, vice-president of the Prince Rupert Football Association, and others present were Miss S. A. Mills, W. W. C. O'Neill, George Cochrane and W. E. Willis-Croft. Miss A. A. Mills was appointed secretary treasurer of the Junior League.

It was decided to play two games, one before the summer vacation and the second, after. The winners of these two series will play off for the city championship.

The season will open on May 2 when the first game will be played at 6.30 on the Acropolis Hill grounds between the High School and Booth School after a procession from downtown led by the Boys' Band. With three teams, High School, Booth School and Borden Street School in the league, the schedule for the first half of the season will be as follows:

Prince George is going in for arrangements for the annual stampede to be held on July 1 and 2 on no mean scale, the cash prizes offered representing an outlay of some \$3,500. The most important of a big program of events will be the Prince George Derby with prizes of \$275, \$150 and \$75. Other important races will be the Telkwa, Williams Lake, Vanderhoof and Quesnel Stakes, each of which there will be prizes of \$125, \$50 and \$25. There will also be a number of novelty races and bucking contests, etc. In addition to the prizes, about \$1,000 is to be spent on the race track and Prince George expects to draw horsemen and horses from all over the province for the big event.

NEW WORLD ATHLETES LEAVING FOR ENGLAND

Marathon Runner and Hammer Thrower Seeking Honors in Old Country. WINNIPEG, May 5.—Randolph A. Rose, marathoner and J. W. McHolme, champion hammer thrower of Australia and New Zealand, leave on the National this afternoon for Toronto and Montreal, after a brief visit here enroute to Europe from their home in New Zealand. This is their first trip to America and they are making the trip across Canada by easy stages over Canadian National lines. Mr. Rose training on the way for the English championships to be held at Stamford Bridge, England in July.

The New Zealand Marathoner holds the British Empire and world grass track record for one mile of 11:3.5 and the Australian record of 31:35 for 6 1/2 miles cross country run. All racing in New Zealand and Australia is done on grass tracks or over natural country, according to Mr. Rose, who never saw a cinder track until he landed in Canada. If the strike in Great Britain does not interfere with their arrangements Mr. Rose and Mr. McHolme his trainer, will sail from New York on July 3.

MONEY VOTED TO IMPROVE GROUNDS

The city council last night voted \$150 to be used in connection with the improvement of the Acropolis Hill athletic grounds this year. Ald. Perry, chairman of the board of works, reported that the new road to the grounds was finished and asked what was to be done about repairing the grounds.
