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

The halibut situation was being studied by the international commission, Dr. Clemens said. This left the salmon as the chief subject of study for the biological board. Of these the sockeye were the most important. They were a fish with uniform color, rich in oils and fat and well adapted to canning.

The principal sockeye rivers were the Fraser and the Skeena. At one time the Fraser was most important but today it had yielded first place to the Skeena. Most of the fish were four year fish, They returned to the river spawn and die four years from the time they were hatched. few returned in three years and some in five and even six, Usuaily they returned from the river

Lord Riddell Says Good Old Days Were Bad Old Days; People More intelligent

LONDON, Mar. 19 .- "I do not believe in the "good old days," said Lord Riddell lecturing on Business and Education," nelieve that, as a rule they were 'bad old days.' I do not believe that there is a word of truth in the statement that is often made that the people of this generation are less industrious, less clever, or less efficient than the people of former generations. I believe that even the ballet girls of the present time are more intelligent, more efficient, and better trained than the ballet girls of the past, and that dancers generally are more efficient than the dancers of the past."

Lord Riddell readily admitted that our educational system needed amendment but on the other hand, there was no doubt that our schools were turning out a large number of able, capable, and well-educated boys and girls, He had always thought that teachers were an unfortunate class and that they had not been properly recognised. Both male and female teachers had been badly paid, "I think if any persons deserve titles and honors," Lord Riddell added, "they are the school teachers."-(Cheers).
