Mrs. J. O'Donnell, who has been visiting at Massett with her parents Mr. and Mrs. James Martin, returned to the city on the Prince John this morning. Mr. O'Donnell, who is engaged in the marketing of Massett Inlet logs, is making this city his headquarters for a while.

William Mainwaring of Vancouver, manager of the Northern Electric Co., and J. T. Ormsby, manager for British Columbia and Alberta of the National Carbon Co., were passengers from Stewart to Ocean Falls on the Prince George this morning in the course of a tour of the northern coast on business.

After having spent since 8 o'clock last night in the Skeena River unloading cannery crews and supplies, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. Johnstone, arrived in port from the south at 10 o'clock this morning and sailed at 11.30 for Anyox and the Naas River. The vessel is scheduled to sail from here on her return south at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Henry Felsch, pioneer settler of the Queen Charlotte Islands, arrived in the city on the Prince John this morning from Skidegate for hospital treatment. It was Mr. Felsch who had rather a racking experience recently when his house burned down while he was ill and he was obliged to tramp and crawl two miles in his bare feet in cold weather for shelter.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, after arriving from Stewart and Anyox this morning, moved up to the dry dock at 7.30 and was almost immediately taken up on the pontoons for her annual overhaul which is to be done in a hurry as the vessel has a special trip to make south next Monday afternoon. The Prince George took the Rupert's place in the regular service, sailing for the south at 10 o'clock.

After having had quite a dusting with howling southeaster while crossing Hecate Straits from Massett Inlet during the night, C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. E. Mabbs, arrived here from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands at 5.30 this morning with thirty passengers and a cargo including 200 tons of coal for the dry dock which is now being discharged. The John will return south by the same route, sailing from here at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening.

Mrs. Dan Lidstone, who has been on a trip south, returned to the city on the Catala this morning.

Father Charlez of Terrace was a passenger sailing for Vancouver aboard the Prince George this morning.

Ernest Pearce arrived on the Catala this morning from Vancouver where he has been spending the winter.

Capt. Alfred Swanson sailed by the Prince George this morning for Vancouver on a business trip. He expects to be away ten days or two weeks.

C. L. Munroe, government agent at Atlin, who has been spending the past couple of days in the city, will sail for the north on the Princess Mary this afternoon.

Mrs. M. A. Greig, Mrs. T. Brooks and Mrs. Frank Lazelle of Terrace, daughters of Mrs. Little, Sr., who is seriously ill in the local hospital arrived in the city from the interior on this morning's train.

Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Craig arrived in the city from Vancouver on the Catala this morning and will proceed tomorrow night by the Prince John to Watun River where Mr. Craig is foreman of the Wallace Fisheries' cannery.

A. C. H. Gerhardt, head of the Homestake Mining Co. which plans extensive developments on the Toric mine in the Alice Arm district this year, was a passenger going south to Vancouver aboard the Prince George this morning.

At 3:15 yesterday afternoon, the fire department responded to another false alarm from the hospital corner, the second that has been rung in from there during the past week or so. It is believed that a youngster playing with the alarm box was responsible for the sending in of the call.

Sid Elmer, representative of El Doro cigars, is a visitor in the city in the course of a regular trip over this territory. Mr. Elmer is prominent in Vancouver athletic circles and last year played in the outfield with the Fraser Cafe team which won the Western Canada senior amateur baseball championship.

Provincial Constable R. Gibson of Port Essington sailed on the Prince George this morning for Vancouver having in his custody Archie McLennan of Anyox, who will be placed in the mental hospital at Essondale, and George Lucas of this city, who was sentenced recently to nine months imprisonment at Okalla for theft of a watch.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Mary, Capt. C. C. Saintry, northbound from Vancouver to Alaska ports, arrived in port at 2 o'clock this afternoon and will sail at 4 o'clock continuing her voyage north. Passengers sailing from here on the vessel will include: Rev. P. E. Baisler for Juneau; C. L. Munroe for Atlin, and E. W. Maxwell for Wrangell.

J. L. W. Wyles of the local Bank of Commerce staff has been moved to Vancouver and expects to leave here either Tuesday or Friday of next week. He will probably be located at the main office in Vancouver. He will be much missed in badminton and tennis circles and among the young people of the city with whom he is very popular.
