"I say Meighen does not represent the Conservative party. I say Conservatives all over the country are shuddering at the things he is saying." said Mr. King. The Premier's reference to Boivin was the saddest incident in the history of the present

Keeley, Pacific Coast manager of the Canadian National Steamships, had put in a tender for the Islands service which would give 80 trips a year out of this port and, if the contract was secured, arrangements were made for the boat to be built at the Prince Rupert shipyards. Plans were already prepared for this.
