## ATTACK MADE UPON RUSSIA

Chancellor of the Exchequer Puts no Restraint on His Words in Dealing With Soviet

LONDON, July 19.—Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, dealt with the Russian methods and Government withdrawal by the daughter, Mrs. H. H. McLeod.

He said:

plunge it into anarchy, and obliterate the British Empire as a force in the world they are convinced that the road will be clear for a general butchery, followed by a universal tyranny of which they will be the head, and out of which they will get the profits.

**Are Powerless**

They will not succeed in their aim. They do not understand at all the resources of tempered strength on which this nation rests.

The parliamentary and democratic institutions of Britain, which were venerable while this band of cosmopolitan conspirators were hiding in the underworlds of the cities of Europe and America—these parliamentary institutions, will continue sedate, powerful, and glorious,

when they have expiated their crimes and their crimes lay buried in a liberated Russia and an enlightened world.

They have their dukes in this country, but H.M. Government is not among them. We understand exactly their aims and their methods.

The question is asked, quite legitimately, why the Government let them stay in this country. It would give a great deal of satisfaction if they were thrown out. Personally, I hope

I shall live to see the day when either there will be a civilized Government in Russia or when we shall have ended the present pretence of friendly relations with the men who are seeking our overthrow.

But we must not let our policy be swayed unduly by our feelings. We must act at each stage with cool and careful judgment.
