ACTIVE SALMON CANNING SEASON

Three New Canneries Building on Queen Charlottes—Others Being Improved

With three new canneries in course of construction and all the existing plants to undergo improvements this spring, a more active salmon packing season in 1926 than ever before is promised for the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Work is now in progress on the new cannery for the B.C. Packers at South Bay in Skidegate, inlet which will be named Butler's cannery with M. English in charge.

Construction of the new cannery at Shannon Bay, five miles from Port Clements, for the Goss-Miller Co. is also proceeding.

At Massett, the Langara Fishing & Packing Co. has started driving piles for the wharf on which its new cannery will be erected.

These three new plants are to be ready for operation this season.

W. C. Splan, owner of the Lockport cannery, arrived there on this trip of the Prince John with a crew of men to get that plant ready for operation.

At Aliford Bay, D. T. Sandison, manager and W. Rennie, his foreman, are getting the Maritime Fisheries cannery ready and the Wallace Fisheries cannery at Watun River, of which D. T. Lutes is the manager, is having piles driven for wharf renewal.

Preparations for fall packing at the Lagoon Bay cannery, belonging to the Canadian Fishing Co., will start later.

CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT.

TAKE NOTICE that a vote of the ratepayers will be taken on the following bylaw in the Council Chamber, City Hall, at the hour of 8 o'clock a.m., and 8 o'clock p.m., on the 15th day of April, 1926, between the hours of 8 o'clock a.m. and 8 o'clock p.m.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXEMPTION OF GRAIN ELEVATOR BUILDINGS, WHARVES, CONVEYERS AND IMPROVEMENTS AND THE LAND UPON WHICH THE SAME ARE SITUATE IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT FROM MUNICIPAL TAXATION.

WHEREAS the Canadian Wheat Producers Limited hereinafter called "the company" have requested the Council of the City of Prince Rupert (hereinafter called "the Council") to submit to the ratepayers of the said City, entitled to vote thereon, a bylaw to the effect that the ratepayers of the said City, entitled to vote thereon, should be exempted from municipal taxation of the grain elevator, wharves, conveyers and improvements appurtenant thereto situated on the south-west by Water Street, being 1500 feet of waterfront bounded on the south-west by City Waterfront on the south-east by the right-of-way of the Canadian National Railway and on the north-east by a line drawn parallel to and 1500 feet north-easterly from the south-west boundary, and all such land shall be totally exempt from municipal taxation for a period of two years from the 1st day of January, 1926, and in the event of the said Company, its successors and assigns, obtaining an extension of the lease of the said elevator for a further term, and operating such elevator during such further term, then such elevator shall be exempt during such further term, and in the event of the said Company, its successors and assigns, purchasing such elevator and operating the same then such elevator shall be exempt for a period of ten years but not further.

2. It is distinctly understood and the intention of this bylaw is that the property hereby exempted shall only continue during such period as such property is held and operated by the Company, its successors and assigns. If, at any time, such property shall cease to be held and operated by the said Company, its successors and assigns, then this exemption shall terminate and the same shall thereupon become again subject to assessment and taxation.

3. This Bylaw shall not come into force or take effect until it has been submitted to the electors of the Municipality, entitled to vote upon bylaws to contract a debt and has received the assent of not less than three-fifths of the number of the electors who shall vote upon such bylaw.

MOTOR VEHICLES LIMITED LOAD

Highway Regulations to go into Force First of Next Month

VICTORIA, April 15.—Weight of vehicles which may be operated on British Columbia roads under the new safety-first highway regulations, which will go into force May 1, were announced by the Public Works Department. The maximum weight of any vehicle which may travel on any road in the province, including its load, is set at 20,000 pounds, but this figure is varied and graduated downward according to the construction of the road travelled and the season of the year.

On Class 1 roads, those constructed entirely of concrete, or with a granite block, wood block, brick or bituminous top laid on a bituminous or cement base, the gross weight of a vehicle including its load must not exceed 20,000 pounds in the summer period, from April 15 to October 15, and 16,000 pounds during the winter period.

On Class 2 roads, those constructed of waterbound macadam, or bituminous bound stone or gravel not laid on a bituminous or cement base, the maximum weight in the summer is set at 16,000 pounds and in the winter 10,000 pounds.

On roads of Class 3, including all roads not mentioned in the other two classes, the maximum summer weight is 10,000 pounds and the winter weight 5,000 pounds. This rule will affect all the ordinary gravel roads of the province.

The Minister of Public Works, Hon. W. J. Sutherland, is given power in the new regulations to allow the operation of any vehicle in excess of these weights as he sees fit by special permit. In every case, however, the operator of a vehicle of excessive weight must pay for any damage he does to highways. In cases where it seems necessary, the minister may require such operators to post a bond with him to cover possible highway damage.
