CONSERVATIVES HAVE RALLY

DELEGATES TO KAMLOOPS CONVENTION REPORTED AT SMOKER LAST NIGHT

CLUBROOM OPENED

Consensus of Opinion is That Party is Due for Victory

The new Conservative rooms on Third Avenue were well filled last evening for the dual purpose of formal opening and to tender a reception to the delegates who attended the Kamloops convention. President George Munro was in the chair and complimented the committee which had been responsible for securing and fitting up the quarters.

The gathering was of an informal character and, during the course of the evening generous supplies of cigars and cigarettes were passed around. J. C. Brady, M.P., C. H. Orme, A. W. Edge, Mayor S. M. Newton and W. W. Wright each gave an account of the convention proceedings and, at the end, a hearty vote of thanks was passed by the gathering for the full report of what was described as the most important Conservative convention ever held.

J. C. Brady, M.P., who was a member of the resolutions committee gave a very interesting and extensive report of the various moves made by the convention to name a leader of the party and described in detail the tense feeling existing in the convention after the withdrawal of Mr. Bowser as a candidate for the leadership. Ballot after ballot revealed that a deadlock existed and, as far as the four names of Leon J. Ladner, Col. Nelson Spencer, C. F. Davie and Senator J. D. Taylor were concerned, it was evident that it was not possible to select one who would be able to carry the necessary sixty per cent of the votes to be elected as leader. At the time, Mr. Brady related, when it seemed that the convention would either terminate unsuccessfully or in disorder, an adjournment for the evening dinner hour was taken. It was felt that an opportunity for a very calm consideration of the question might lead to an agreement.

After the dinner hour no further ballots were taken, but a committee of the Dominion members, and senators, and the provincial members and members of the executive was held in an effort to provide a solution. Upon their return to the Convention hall President R. L. Maitland asked that Leon J. Ladner move and Senator J. D. Taylor second the nomination of Dr. Tolmie which was done and the deadlock was broken amidst the hilarious

OMENS OF VICTORY

C. H. Orme briefly complimented the committee which arranged the smoker and provided the quarters for the Conservatives of the city. He then gave a brief outline of the doings at the convention and remarked that possibly the Conservative party was never so united as at the present time. "Every indication," he said, "points to an overwhelming victory at the polls when the Oliver government decides to appeal to the people."

A. W. Edge spoke in happy vein of his experiences at the convention and, paid tribute to Dr. Tolmie, the new leader. He spoke of the difficulty of securing suitable accommodation at Kamloops for such a large gathering and complimented the residents of that city for their generous hospitality. He described the arrangements made for providing accommodation in private homes and gave generous praise to Cyril Westaway, formerly of this city, who was chairman of the committee of arrangements.

Mayor S. M. Newton, in telling of his impressions of the convention, said that it seemed to be the general opinion on the third day of the convention that a split in the Conservative ranks was inevitable. "Just when the feeling was most tense" he said, "a most happy solution was arrived at and the delegates left that hall a united party to meet the Oliver government whenever it decides upon a contest."

The two resolutions submitted to the convention by the local Association were the subject of a few remarks by W. W. Wright. Both of these had received the unanimous support of the gathering. The Convention unanimously approved of the completion of the Skeena highway from Prince Rupert to Prince George and further adopted a policy of road building which would open up more of the province to settlers. The other resolution dealing with the changing of the name of the Association from Liberal-Conservative Association to Conservative Association was also passed by the convention unanimously. Mr. Wright confirmed the reports of the other delegates that J. C. Brady, M.P., as a member of the resolutions committee, had created a very favorable impression at the gathering and as Mr. Orme had already indicated, the constituency was placed on the map at the Convention.
