EGGS BY MILLION SOLD IN HOLLAND

Also Over Million Duck Eggs Sold in Year in One Market
 ROERMOND, Holland, April 3.
 A sight only second to the great Dutch cheese market at Alkmaar is the egg market of Roermond, claimed to be the largest in Europe.
 Here, hen fruit is sold by the million. Last year 93,266,012 eggs, weighing 5,558 tons, were sold by auction under producers' co-operative rules, realizing a net profit of about \$2,750,000. A record for one day's sale was established on April 25, when 3,150,883 eggs changed hands.
 In the same year, 1,282,060 duck eggs, weighing more than seventy-three tons, were sold for more than \$35,000.
