Sees Great Things For Portland Canal.

The editor of the Portland Canal News in telling the Rotary Club about the district and its prospects emphasized what he believed to be a fact that mines would yet be developed which would be greater than the Premier. He mentioned three properties that looked as if they were likely to do this. They are not stock selling proposition but are being financed, one by British capital, one by Canadian, and the other by American. They are showing so well that each is assured a bright future as a shipping mine, even if it does not produce as much and as richly as the Premier. And yet they are only three of a hundred properties that are good prospects.

What is true for the Stewart area, Mr. Rolston believes, is true of other sections of this great mineralized district. Mining is one of the great industries that will make this a rich country.

Not Be Discouraged At Elevator Situation.

There is nothing at all discouraging about the elevator situation. The building is not yet finished and it will be more than a month before the contractors will be ready to hand it over to the government. It could not be expected that much grain could go through until it was completed. While it is true that it is now ready to handle any grain that offers, this condition has not obtained long. Several visitors who have looked over the new "house" say they do not think there can be much business expected this year. It has to be ready at the beginning of the season in order to be quite successful. However, there is still a possibility that something will be done. The season is not by any means over.

Government Confers With Opposition.

When the government confers with the opposition in regard to something it is worthy of note. It is telegraphed far and wide. We were told yesterday that they were to confer over the appointment of an investigating commission for the customs department.

It seems a pity that government and opposition cannot confer often. There must be good suggestions made by the opposition that would be worth adopting and it is a pity that the country should suffer just because of political strife.

When members are elected to parliament they are not sent there to fight for party or to sacrifice the country's welfare for the puny advantage of a possible party triumph. As electors become more intelligent, they will insist that representatives give them honest service without too strict adherence to party lines. They will often have to vote for or against proposed legislation and not for or against the party.

Need Of Publicity For Prince Rupert.

If ever there was need of publicity for Prince Rupert there is need for it now. We now have something to sell. We have the port facilities to offer to the farmers and dealers of the prairies and it is up to us to let them know that it is here and what it can do. Prince Rupert as a port must be the subject for us to tell the world about. They know little enough of it now and of the facilities we offer. In the near future they should know a great deal more and should look to us for the service which we as an ocean-port should give them.

GRAIN OUTLET PRINCE RUPERT

Edmonton Journal has Display Story Telling of Situation as Seen There

VIEWS OF EXPORTERS

Secretary of Board of Trade Says Will Keep Hopper Filled to Overflowing

The Edmonton Journal of Saturday last publishes an article under a two column display headline about the Prince Rupert elevator and possible grain shipments this way. The article follows:

Prince Rupert through its board of trade, is making a determined bid for a share of the grain movement from Alberta and other western provinces. In a wire to the Edmonton board of trade on Wednesday night the claims of Prince Rupert as a grain port are put forward, and the co-operation of Edmonton board is sought in a campaign looking to the shipment of prairie grain via this terminus.

"From the press we learn," says the wire, "that your organizations are much exercised over embargo on grain at various points and elevator centres, and that over ten thousand cars are held up at sidings."

Big Storage Elevator

"Elevator here has storage capacity of million and a quarter bushels; can unload about 200 cars daily, deliver to ship fifty thousand bushels an hour, and dry twenty thousand bushels daily. C.G.M.M. quote same export rates from here as from Vancouver. Further understand other companies offering same rates. A further advantage is that there are no harbor dues here. Elevator is now ready for business. Can you arrange to use these facilities? We are prepared to give you any further information you require and any assistance we can.—Prince Rupert Board of Trade."

John Gillespie of the Gillespie Grain Company, when asked concerning possibilities for the shipment of Alberta grain via Prince Rupert, pointed out that the matter rested entirely with the exporting companies.

It is up to Exporters

"If the exporters request it, we will be only too glad to ship grain to Prince Rupert," said Mr. Gillespie. At the present time, however, he pointed out, orders are for western shipments to Vancouver only. The Gillespie company does not carry on an export business, which is separate and distinct in itself.

Regarding the embargo, Mr. Gillespie pointed out that only tough grain is being held up. The trouble has arisen, he says, through lack of adequate facilities for the drying of tough grain in Vancouver. There is no embargo on grain of the higher grades.

Might Need More Boats

If grain is to be shipped via Prince Rupert, the exporters must get together. It might be necessary to arrange for sufficient boats to handle it, suggested G. L. Bayer, local manager of James Richardson and Sons, Limited, grain dealers. The policy of the Richardson company is determined from the western office in Winnipeg; however, and Mr. Bayer was therefore not prepared to say anything on the matter insofar as his company was concerned. James Richardson and Sons ship grain to Vancouver only as it is ordered, and they have therefore not encountered trouble by reason of any embargo on shipments.

If the people at both Vancouver and Prince Rupert will "open the spout," Alberta farmers will "keep the hopper filled to overflowing." John Blue, secretary of the Edmonton board of trade, in commenting upon the wire from Prince Rupert.

AIR SURVEYS CARRIED ON

Lot of Country in East is Already Mapped From Air Says Report Made Yesterday

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 5.—The Royal Canadian Air Force in co-operation with the Topographical Survey Department of the Interior during 1925, photographed nearly 38,000 square miles of unexplored country east of Lake Winnipeg, in the province of Manitoba, and the district of Patricia in Ontario, says the report of the Topographical Survey committee of the Association of Dominion Land Surveyors, at the annual meeting here yesterday. Surveyors are still pioneering, the report continued, and in order that the prospector may follow, it is necessary to lead the way through unknown waterways and arduous portages, fixing in correct relative position important topographical features. Dominion Land Surveyors unflinchingly accept the onerous duty of acting as navigational officers with the Royal Canadian Air Force, and guide the planes across the wide blank spaces of existing maps. "A little more than half a century ago," says the report, "when Rupert's Land was ceded to Canada, Dominion Land Surveyors laid out the first farms in the fertile valley of the Red River and with oxen and teams made their way across the boundless prairies, pioneers preparing for the vast multitudes of settlers to follow.

Forest Lands

Today they are still leading the way, but the objective is now the forest and mineral lands and while surveys are just as necessary in the development of this vast heritage, the requirements are different. The rectangular work of lines necessary to mark off the farms has given way to the control surveys essential to the making of adequate maps of the new country. In surveying farm lands the country had to be gone over with a fine tooth comb as it were, for lines had to be run one mile apart and had to be cleared through the woods. Now important water routes many miles apart are traversed by the surveyors and the intervening details are filled in with the aid of the most modern survey instrument, the seaplane and camera.
