Prisoners Stage Hunger Strike; Claim Cooks Had Dirty Nails

VANCOUVER (P-A short-lived hunger strike of 250 prisoners at Oakalla Prison was staged Tuesday, Warden Hugh Christie reported Wednesday.

Oakalla was the scene of a major riot last week in suburban Burnaby. It has 800 prisoners. When the trays came around with full meals, most of the

prisoners in the east wing took only tea and bread and sent the rest of the meal back untouched.

The strike was staged after some prisoners had made complaints to the warden. One report said the men complained that kitchen workers had had dirty fingernails.
