**GIRLS DO NOT SMOKE  
TORONTO UNIVERSITY**

President Falconer Says There  
is no Rule Against it but it  
is Not Done

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—Women  
students of the University of Tor-  
onto and its affiliated college  
are not permitted to smoke on  
college property. There is at  
present no rule against it, but  
smoking by women students  
"simply isn't being done, and  
hasn't been done on university  
property, so the matter has  
never been officially discussed,"  
according to information from  
the office of President Sir  
Robert Falconer.

"We are not blind to the fact  
that some of our young women  
smoke at parties and in their  
clubrooms or sororities; but this  
custom is recognized as unethi-  
cal in the college buildings, and  
it is not done." Such is the  
opinion of one leading university  
authority.

**VERSATILE JANITOR  
MARRIED A COUPLE**

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 16.—  
The fifth wedding of Mrs. Bran-  
des who her last husband calls  
the exponent of experimental  
marriages was performed at  
Salinas, California, a year ago,  
but she was not married at all,  
Juan Brandes a mining engineer  
revealed today.

A versatile janitor in the of-  
fice of the Salinas Justice of the

until three days later when the
