GRANBY IS BIG PRODUCER NOW

Four Million Pounds of Copper Monthly From Both Mines Making Profit

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The Hidden Creek and Allenby properties of the Granby Consolidated are now producing close to 4,000,000 pounds of copper monthly, or at the annual rate of 48,000,000 pounds. In October, on a production of 3,500,000 pounds, costs averaged 9.46c a pound, and the net profit for the month was around \$175,000. Even on the basis of today's somewhat lower prices, Granby must be earning at the monthly rate of around \$152,000 before depreciation, or at the annual rate of approximately \$1,824,000. Bond interest now amounts to around \$260,740. In 1924 the company charged off for depreciation \$925,733. Presumably, current depreciation charges will not be proportionately as heavy, but even assuming they are, and including interest, Granby is earning at the annual rate of almost \$2 a share. If current depreciation charges are reduced to, say, \$600,000 annually, Granby must be earning close to \$3 a share annually. The company has not paid any dividends for some years but should begin to do so soon.

WEEK OF RADIO TESTS COMING

Special Efforts to Cross Atlantic to British Isles to be Made

N. S. CO-OPERATING

MONTREAL, Jan. 16.—Canadian night will be one of the features of the program prepared for the week of international radio tests which have been arranged for the period from Sunday, January 24 to Sunday, January 31 inclusive. On the night of Saturday, January 30, the test hour will be given over to broadcasting stations in the Dominion and of those CNRO, Canadian National Railways, Ottawa, will open the special transmission hour. Fifteen minutes will be allotted to each station participating.

To aid in the services of transmission tests which have been destined specially to cross the Atlantic to and from the British Isles and Europe generally, a silent hour has been arranged for each night and this period will be observed by all broadcasting stations in Canada and the U.S. at the hour corresponding with 10 to 11 p.m. standard time. It is hoped the owners of receiving sets in the North American continent will be successful in tuning in to trans-Atlantic stations which will be broadcasting specially for the purpose.

Friday and Saturday, January 29 to 30, between 11 and 12 p.m., eastern standard time, will be devoted to special test broadcasts from stations on this side. On Friday night the U.S. stations will have the air, fifteen minutes being devoted to each of the four time zones, Eastern, Central, Mountain and Pacific. During that time, stations outside the allotted zone will remain silent.

On Saturday night, Canada will have the air and all stations south of the international boundary will remain silent during the hour given over to Canadian broadcasting.

WARMER WEATHER IS REPORTED TODAY IN ALL NORTHERN B.C.

SEALED TENDERS, endorsed "Tender for part of Prince Rupert Wharf Reconstruction" will be received by the Honorable the Minister of Public Works up to noon on Monday, the twenty-fifth day of January, 1926, for reconstruction of the western part of Provincial Government Wharf at Prince Rupert, B.C. Plans, specifications, contract and terms of tender may be seen on and after the 15th day of January, 1926, and further information obtained from the Department of Public Works, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C., the General Foreman, Department of Public Works, Court House, Vancouver, B.C., and the District Engineer, Court House, Prince Rupert, B.C. Copies of plans, specifications, etc., can be obtained from the Department on payment of a deposit of five dollars which will be refunded on the return of the plans, etc., in good order.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted bank cheque on a chartered bank of Canada, made payable to the Honorable the Minister of Public Works, for the sum of eight hundred dollars, which shall be forfeited if the party tendering declines to enter into contract when called upon to do so. The cheque of the successful tenderer will be retained as security for the due and faithful performance of the work till satisfactory completion of the contract. Tenders will not be considered unless made out on forms supplied, signed with the actual signature of the tenderer and closed in the manner furnished. The lowest or any tender not necessarily accepted.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e. carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range. Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands." Purchase and lease of industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranked, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partly free permits are issued for cattle, horses and travelers, up to ten head.
