Scottish War Bride Returns to Native Land

GLASGOW (CP)—War bride Mrs. Peggy Larson of Duncan, Vancouver Island, is back in her native Glasgow for the first time in six years, "with a wee bit o' Canada."

Instead of the usual photographs, she has a batch of lively pastel sketches done by herself. And during her few weeks' holiday before returning to her school-teaching husband in Canada, she is holding an exhibition in a Glasgow gallery.

The paintings are vivid portrayals of Indian children who live near her home, and they help span the miles between Canada's Pacific coast and the throb and bustle of this shipping metropolis.

"It would have been impossible to describe what these children really look like," she said. "They are so wild and un-civilized, with their background of logs, strips of cloth and fish hanging up to dry on queer wooden stands."

Mrs. Larson, whose maiden name was Lawson, finds it easier to paint to her paintings. They tell more clearly than words how different it all is from Scotland. In return, she may take a few sketches of Scotland back to Canada, just to show what her "hame ground" looks like.

Use All the Clues When You Finesse

Many a contract depends on declarer's decision as to which of two possible finesses to take. Sometimes there is nothing to go on and it is just about a toss-up.

More often, however, there clues available to the alert player, which point to one line of play as offering a better chance than the other.

Mr. Abel had such a decision to make in today's deal and he muffed it. This is not surprising as he plays his worst bridge when Mr. Champion is his partner. Mr. Champion's constant badgering confuses him and reduces his ability to think out the problem at hand.

Mrs. Keen opened her fourth best heart, the trey. The four was played from dummy. Mr. Dale played the jack and the ace in the closed hand won.

Mr. Abel saw that he had eight tricks in top cards—four diamonds, two clubs, a spade and the heart already won. He set about finding a ninth. First, he cashed four diamonds, discarding a spade from dummy on the last one. Mr. Dale had to make two discards and he chose the deuce and five of spades, in that order.

Next came a low club and dummy's jack was finessed. Mr. Dale won with the queen and returned the queen of spades. After much agonizing, Mr. Abel played the ace, planning to try for three club tricks which he could get if the opposing clubs split 3-3.

But it was no good. Mrs. Keen showed out on the third lead of clubs, discarding the six of hearts. Mr. Dale was thrown in with the fourth club and after cashing the king of hearts he led a spade up to Mrs. Keen's king-10, completing the set. The club finesse was not Mr.

He Knew the Day He Was Going to Die

What does a man do when he knows, almost to the hour, the day he's going to die? That that final day on this earth is just three weeks away? What would he do?

Dr. Harry M. Cassidy, Canada's outstanding authority in the social-welfare field, faced this question just a year ago. He was 51, happily married with three children.

As director of the University of Toronto School of Social Work, he was respected and honored at home and abroad. He was once in charge of training administrative personnel for UNRRA; had been to Egypt for the UN, which now wanted him to go to Burma to head welfare work; had worked and taught in several universities.

Now he knew he was going to die very soon.

The inspiring story of what Dr. Cassidy did is told in the October 1 issue of Maclean's by Sidney Katz, a close friend, himself a Master of Social Work. Under the title, "The Last Days of Harry Cassidy," Katz tells how Cassidy calmly and resourcefully used the time that was left to "clean his desk," to plan ahead for the achievement of his idealistic aims, to encourage his co-workers, to help his family with the problems that still lay in their future.

So strongly did Cassidy's dying-breath devotion to the tasks that had been his lifework inspire his colleagues, friends and associates throughout Canada that a national fund has been opened to set up a research bequest in his name. Chairman of the appeal committee is Dr. A. E. Grauer, chairman of the B.C. Power Corporation. Other officers include H. M. Turner, president of Canadian General Electric, and Douglas Ambridge, president of Abitibi Power and Paper.
