POLICING WILL BE

IMPORTANT ISSUE. Probably overshadowing the contests for civiv office and the \$35,000 sewer bylaw, in itself an important measure, the referendum on policing will very likely develop into the most discussed issue at the January election. Some people have rather strong views on the larity of the various members of the matter and there will likely be some hot talk.

There is, undoubtedly, a large portion of the electorate that will vigorously favor the continuation of the present provincial police system as being preferable to a city force with permanent resident officers. There will also be a great many who will with equal vigor support the idea of again establishing a city force on the principle that the city should have full government of its own affairs including the highly important matter of policing. The issue will be decided by the electors on January 13.

One thing upon which very nearly overyone is agreed is that the present city detachment of the provincial police contains a fine personnel and that good work has been done since Sergeant Hannah their dormitory. and his men took over the task of keeping law and order here.
