IRON HOUSES FOR ENGLAND

About 250 Being Built at Derby to Solve Housing Problem

LONDON, April 12. — Neville Chamberlain, minister of health, visited Derby and addressed a Conservative and Unionist meeting in the evening, and he took advantage of the occasion to see what Derby is doing to solve the housing problem.

Derby is the first town in the country to undertake on a large scale the erection of cast-iron houses. About 250 of them are being constructed on the Osmaston Park estate, which is a couple of miles from the centre of Derby and in proximity to new brick houses which have been built and others which are being built.

Quite Modern The greatest interest naturally centred in the iron buildings, which consisted of three bedrooms, one living room, a kitchen, and a bathroom.

Success in Sight

Mr. Chamberlain added that on October 1 next he had to consider the cost of the housing subsidy of the past two years and what it was likely to be in the next two years. Whatever the alteration of the subsidy might be if it were altered, he said he could at any rate say this, that in regard to any houses that were substantially begun before the first of October next they would receive the subsidy at the old rate.

TRAIN PICKED UP VERA CRUZ

Radio Broadcast from Mexican City Came In for 30 Minutes

MONTREAL, April 12.—An interesting record in long distance radio reception on a moving train has been established by the Continental Limited, the transcontinental train for the Canadian National Railways in picking up and holding for thirty minutes a broadcast from Vera Cruz, Mexico.

While the train was leaving Holden, Alberta, moving westward to Edmonton the operator Savage tuned on what to him was an entirely new station and which he presently identified as being in Vera Cruz. It was at 9.30 p.m. Mountain time that the train receiving set picked up the Mexican station and the reception continued for the next thirty minutes until Shonts was reached when C.N.R.V. Vancouver replaced Vera Cruz.

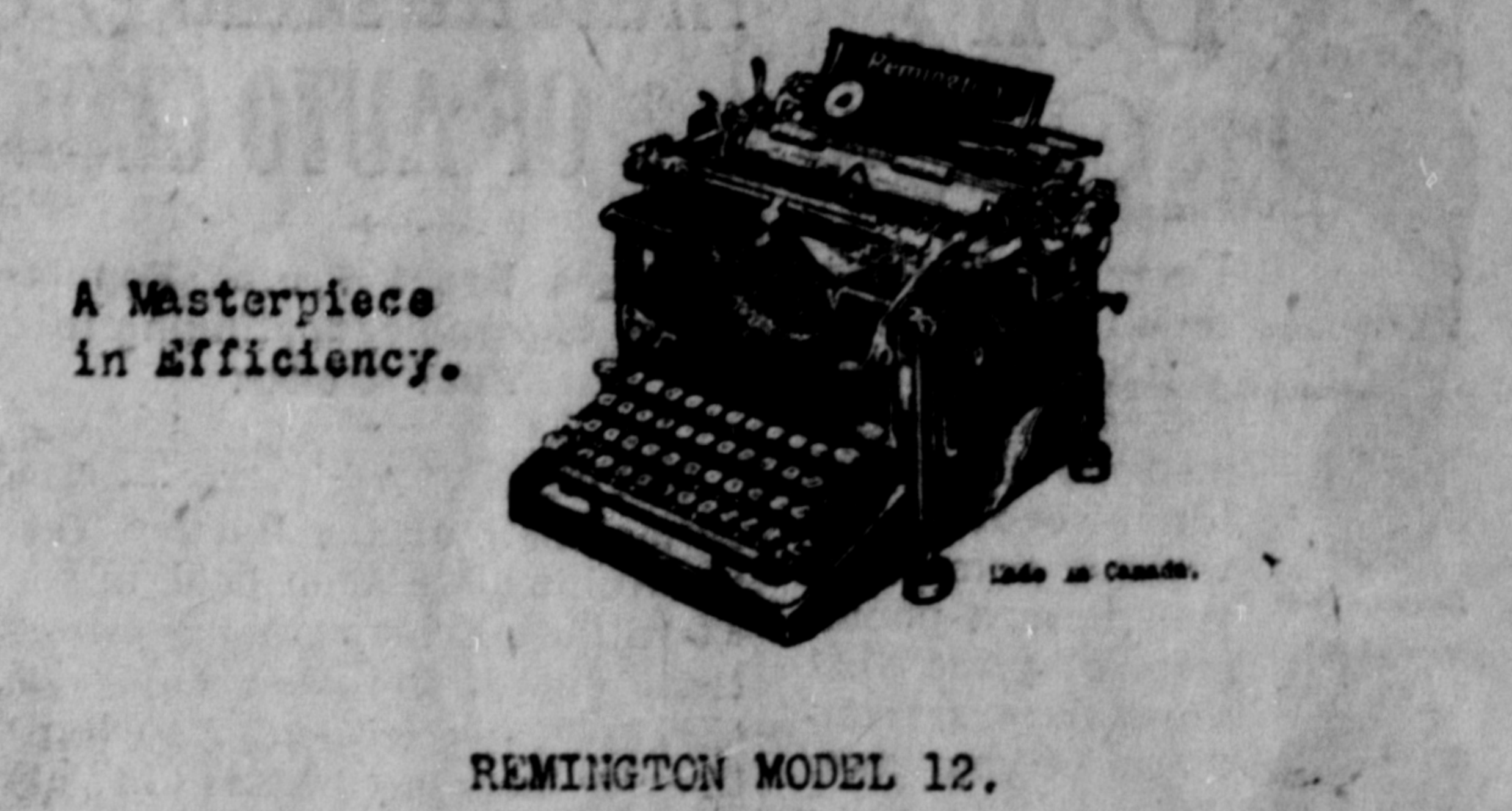
In The Letter Box
