

POLAR PROBLEM IS NOW SOLVED

Nothing But Detail Work Left, Says Amundsen, Who Reached Seattle Yesterday.

Pole from Europe to Alaska, arrived here on Sunday from Nome. "My work is finished and all the bis problems are solved," declared Capt. Amundsen. "The work that remains in polar exploration is only a matter of detail. Let others handle it."

Seven Norwegian members of the party said they would likely organize another Arctic expedition with the aid of Ellsworth, who is Amundsen's, financial backer.

Amundsen expressed himself as "virtually certain" that there was no land on the route which was followed by the Norge. One hundred thousand square miles of icy wastes occasionally broken by open water had been seen on the trip, he said. It was thought that islands might lie on one side or other of the route, more likely the west side.

Amundsen left on Sunday night for New York on route to Norway.
