### Maritime Provinces Will Give Liberals Several More Members Than Lasl Election

A letter received by a Prince Rupert man from a friend in Montreal says "I have just returned from the Maritime provinces and have discussed our (the Liberal) prospects with Walter Foster and Veniot and other leaders in New Brunswick, and the most conservative estimate that I can get of our chances in New Brunswick is that they are confident we will beat Fleming in Carleton county. Doucet in Kent, and probably win Madawaska and Restigouche, besides, of course, holding Gloucester county where Veniot is running. In the other counties the party is badly organized and apathetic.

"Dick O'Brien, the editor of the St. John Globe, the chief Liberal paper in New Brunswick, and in my judgment the shrewdest forecaster of political results, looks for a total gain of eight seats in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. When I say gains, of course I mean holding the seats we have already and gaining the others."

This writer told of meeting a former Prince Rupert man who had just returned from a motor trip through Nova Scotia, including Cape Breton. He states that the general opinion is that the Liberals will carry Cape Breton, which they lost at the last election, and will also carry Digby county and that all through the province there is a much better feeling amongst the Liberals than existed last year.

A high official of the C. P. R. informed this man that among those best qualified to judge Mr. Meighen is making a very poor campaign and his method of appealing to the different provinces for the purpose of enlisting their purely local interests irrespective of national interests has lost him confidence throughout Canada and the politicians in Montreal are of the opinion that Mr. Mackenzie Kingsissmaking a better campaign than Meighen. "It is openly admitted here in Montreal," he says, "that the Conservatives will lose three seats in Montreal which they already hold. The same C. P. R. official made the statement three days ago that Patenaude would be beaten in Jacques Cartier.

Concluding the letter this man says he hopes things look as rosy in British Columbia as in the east. He says he knows Skeena is perfectly safe, but the Conservatives in the east are claiming that it and all other British Columbia seats will go Conservative, so he knows what reliance to put on such claims.
