BLACKWOOD on Bridge

 Seasoned Player Tries
 Less Risky Lines First

In many contracts where the final trick you need is in doubt, there are several ways to go about developing that trick. The wise declarer will try these various lines of play in a certain, proper order. That is, he will try first the line of play which, if it does not develop as he hoped, will not result in immediate defeat.

Take today's deal, for example. Mr. Dale found himself in a fairly optimistic, but reasonable, slam contract. He won the opening lead of the jack of spades on the board with the ace and paused to plan his campaign.

As he saw it, he had three chances for success—if the diamonds broke 3-3, if the ace of hearts were on his left, or if the jack of hearts were on his left, regardless of the position of the ace.

The most dangerous of these alternatives was the finesse against the jack of hearts on the first lead of that suit. Correctly, then, Mr. Dale made a mental note to reserve that play as a last resource.

He extracted all of the outstanding trumps, then entered his hand with the king of clubs and led the ten of hearts.

If Mr. Meek had played the ace, all would have been well as a small diamond from the closed hand could have been discarded on dummy's hearts.

But Mr. Meek followed with a small heart and dummy's king was killed by Mr. Abel's ace. Mr. Abel returned a club and Mr. Dale won with dummy's ace. He now tried his second alternative, that of finding the opposing diamonds divided evenly. On the third diamond, however, Mr. Meek showed out and that chance was gone.

Only at this point did he try

the dangerous heart finesse. His two previous tries, though unsuccessful, had not put him down one. He led the eight of hearts, finessed dummy's nine and parked his fourth diamond on the queen of hearts to make the slam.

Big Crop Forecast For N.B. Potatoes

SAINT JOHN, N.B. — Another good year for the producers of New Brunswick's largest cash crop—potatoes—is in prospect. Prices received by growers for the 1951 bumper yield of some 18,000,000 bushels went up to \$10 a barrel. They may go even higher for this year's crop. A predicted shortage in the United States and reduced New Brunswick production are expected to improve the market.

Heavy spring rains followed by drought dealt a blow to the yield in this province. Although harvesting will not be complete until well along in October, growers have estimated the crop will be about 25 per cent less than that of 1951. The quality, however, is reported excellent.

The average yield last year was about 125 barrels an acre. Growers believe it will be nearer 100 barrels this season. Farmers spend close to \$3 to grow and harvest each barrel of potatoes.

In the United States, where a normal crop is 350,000,000 bushels, this year's harvest is estimated at 337,000,000—more than last year but not enough to satisfy demand. The general Canadian production also is expected to be below normal.
