IMMIGRANTS

This Many Reach Canada and Are Destined for Farm Life.

MONTREAL, July 6 .- Arrivals of new settleds and agricultural workers entering the Dominion at Atlantic ports and afterwards proceeding to their destinations over the lines of the Canadian National Railways to the number of 1.543 landed at Quebec and 433 at Halifax.

On the White Star liner Regina, docking at Quebec. 381 third class passengers were practically all destined for the land. Of the total 150 were farm workers from selected continental countries secured through the overseas offices of the department of colonization and natural resources of the G. N. R. The group is for placement on farms in the prairie provinces and work is assured for every man in the party. On board the Cunarder Aulaunia, 679 third class passengers landed at Quebec. Of this number 350 were single men farm workers from European countries who are going west to take up land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan] and Alberta. The Anchor Donaldson liner Athenia brought i83 British third class passengers, a party of 55, including some boys brought out by the Ontario government immigration service being included.
