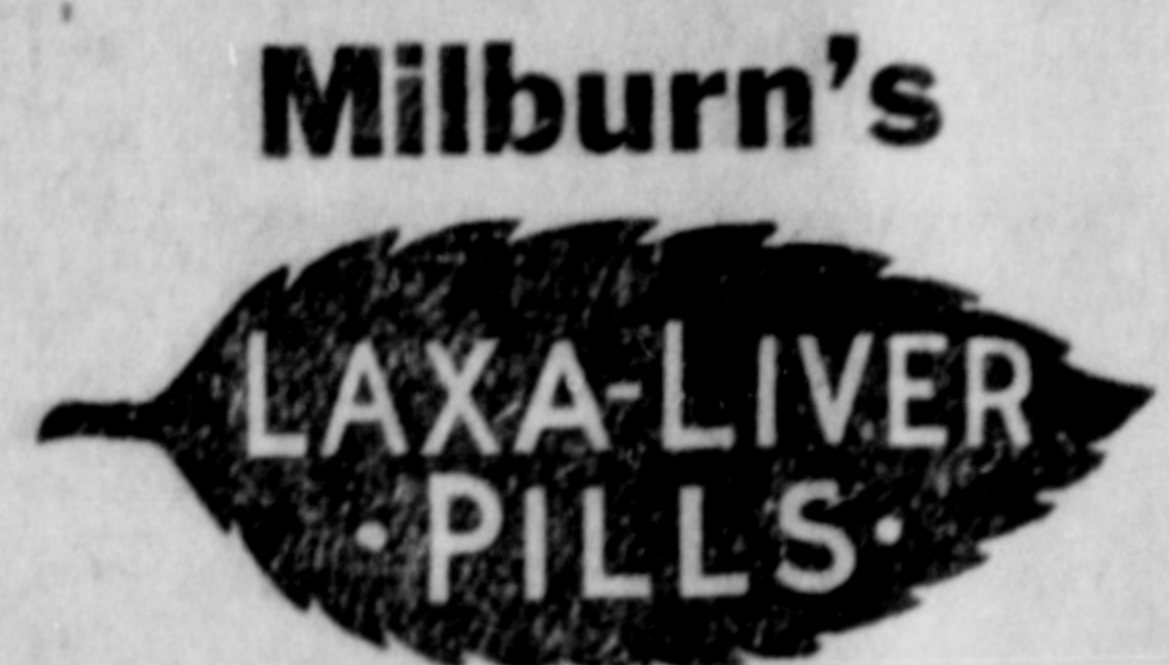

FOOTBALL PICTURES ON POSTAGE STAMPS

Athletic Series Being Issued by Post Office in Hungaria

BUDAPEST, Feb. 1. — Football has received the honor of illustrating postage stamps. The recent issue of stamps by the Hungarian government might be called the "athletic series." In addition to football, swimming, diving, hurdling, skating, fencing and skiing are portrayed. The denominations vary from one hundred crowns to twenty-five hundred. Physical exercise for adults or bedroom physical culture is rated at 100 crowns, while the "high jump" rather appropriately represents the most expensive stamp of the series, 2,500 crowns.

ANCIENT PAINTINGS IN JAPAN EXPENSIVE

TOKYO, Feb. 1. — More than 350 curios, ancient autographs and paintings, part of the collection inherited by Marquis K. Inouye from his father, were sold at auction for a total of 2,450,996 yen.
The art object which sold for the highest sum was a tea bowl of quaint design which was brought to Japan from Korea about 350 years ago. It sold for 109,500 yen and was purchased by T. Fujita, a millionaire mine owner of Osaka.
Sixty articles were sold at prices in excess of 10,000 yen and more than 83 for sums larger than 3,000 yen.

TAXES DEMANDED OF ALASKAN VESSELS

Dollar a Ton Has to be Paid by Norco, Bellingham and Many Others

Steps are being taken by J. H. Dunn, clerk of the U.S. District Court for the collection of federal tonnage taxes for 1924-25 on ocean-going and coastwise vessels owned and operated in Alaskan waters, it was made known in Juneau recently, says the Empire. Some 38 or 40 vessels in this division, it was reported, are subject to this tax and it is estimated that about \$3,000 are due for last year.

So far as is known this is the first time on record that efforts to collect this tax have been made. It is provided for in section 2,569 Compiled Laws of Alaska which fixes the rate of taxation at \$1.00 per net ton, custom house measurement, to be paid by the owner or operator of any seagoing or coastwise vessel doing local business for hire, plying in Alaskan waters.

The largest vessel claimed to come under the law is the Motorship Oregon, registered here, and owned and operated by the Independent Steamship company. It is registered as being 1,357 net tons capacity.

The Norco, of Ketchikan, and the Bellingham, of the same port, with 431 and 322 tons respectively are the second and third largest vessels on which taxes are claimed.

There are several Douglas boats, a number of Petersburg and Wrangell and many Ketchikan vessels on the list.

SALVATION ARMY IS DOING GREAT WORK

Annual Report For Past Year Just Issued Gives Account of Its Activities For Downtrodden

The annual report of the social work of the Salvation Army for 1925 is now being distributed in all the countries of the world, in which the army is operating. The general statistics show that the army now has 22,362 officers and cadets in field and social work. It has 14,107 corps and outposts, 95,415 local officers, 39,921 senior bandsmen and 10,150 young bandsmen.

The report of the social work shows that new institutions of various kinds are being constantly opened in various countries to meet pressing needs. The total number of these social institutions of the army, some of which are very large and important, is 1,431. In its work for helpless children it has now 96 homes, it also maintains 28 creches for very young children, and 47 industrial schools.

In its work for poor and unfortunate women of many classes it maintains 127 industrial homes. It has also 59 maternity homes, of which Grace Hospital in Winnipeg is one of the largest and best. The army has these maternity institutions in several important cities of western Canada, almost all of which are in urgent need of enlargement to meet the requirements.

Shelters and Depots
In its work for men, the army maintains 81 shelters and food depots, and in addition 15 depots where food only is served. It has 148 hotels for working men. During 1925 it provided beds for 9,527,035 people and supplied 13,251,126 meals. It maintains similar shelters and food depots for women. It has 15 prison safe homes, 6 homes for inebriates and a large number of other industrial institutions of many kinds for both men and women.

The cost of administration of this work has been kept very low, and for this reason the public has continued a consistent support, which has allowed it to be maintained. Accounts are published each year and anyone interested can secure a copy by making application.
