GYMNASIUM AT SEAL COVE WAS DECLARED OPEN

Rev. G. G. Hacker Gave First Address in New Building Last Evening

Rupert East Gymnasium Church opened with an enthusiastic service last night. There were many people present from the central part of the city as well as a goodly number from the east end. The service of song and opening exercises were conducted by Rev. Evan Baker, who in a brief prayer, dedicated the building to God's work which covers social, physical and religious life. Vocal solos by Mrs. J. P. McMillan and A. Clapperton were greatly appreciated by all present.

A practical and appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. Geo. G. Hacker on "Jesus' Conception of the Abundant Life." The speaker gave illustrations of men who lived well but still found their lives one-sided and cramped and ultimately pronounced themselves failures. Jesus was deeply religious, had a master mind, and was a much sought guest. Had we ever thought of him as an athlete or man of physical development? He was a traveller, but there were no trains, steamboats or street cars. Only once did he ride and then on a donkey. Jesus often travelled forty, fifty, or sixty miles on foot. He was always pictured as leading the group. Certainly Jesus was a man of brawn and brain. The Rupert East Gymnasium was built to bring the full life as lived by the master, to the community in which it stands. "It stands here for community service. It is open to all creeds and nationalities. There is no need for any denominational strife and we will be deeply disappointed if any arises. We are here to supply a need in the community," were Mr. Hacker's closing remarks.

JAPANESE WILL BE EXCLUDED

Last Year They were Able to Fish on Seines or Salties in Herring Industry

SALMON MAY FOLLOW

Order of Department of Marine and Fisheries Provides for Oriental Exclusion

A special despatch from Ottawa by A. J. Mackenzie to the Vancouver Star says: By an order forwarded from the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa today to the department here Japanese working at the salties and on the seines in the herring industry of British Columbia will no longer be allowed employment after the end of this fishing season.

This order will mean the displacement of some 100 to 500 Orientals now employed, nearly altogether on the east coast, of Vancouver Island by whites or Indians, according to A. J. Whitmore of the Department of Fisheries here.

Oriental Policy

The original policy of the government at Ottawa was to replace Orientals by whites or Indians at the rate of 25 per cent a year. For the fishing season of 1924-25 it was ordered that all men employed on the seines or at the salties in the herring industry should be whites or Canadian Indians. For the season of 1925-26, now under way, 50 per cent were to be Orientals.

This recent order, given under the authority of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries wipes out the employment of Orientals in the herring industry a year before the time at first stated. In the case of Oriental companies operating, of which there are now but three with charters only two executive officers at the saltery may be Orientals following this season and no other Orientals may be employed in any capacity.

Salmon Not Affected

The order does not effect the salmon canning plants and fisheries although it is thought at the departmental headquarters here that similar action may follow. The salmon fisheries are operating under the same provision but, as it went into effect a year later than the same ruling in the herring fisheries this year, will remain but 25 per cent white or Indian employees.

CANADIAN AND AMERICAN TARIFFS

The claim that the Canadian Tariff should be raised to the level of that of the United States, is based primarily on the economic fallacy, that a tax on imports necessarily restricts importations, and thereby protects the markets. In the second place this claim is based on the delusion that it is in the interests of this country, to threaten the prosperity of its basic industries, in order to foster those of a secondary character; because we have adopted this policy.

Canada's prosperity depends largely on its basic industries, and it is essentially an exporting country, and to impose a high tariff which bears heavily on these industries would be suicidal. A high tariff as an economic or moral principle, cannot be defended, for it is either a form of legalized extortion, or a farce.

It Raises Prices

A tax on imports is called a tariff, duty, etc., and the effect of this tax is determined by the character of the articles upon which it is placed. This tax when levied on articles imported for re-sale establishes a price level, which is at least equal to their declared value (competitive price) with the tax added. The price level thus established for imported articles, determines the prices of the home-products of like quality, in cases wherein competition in prices may be eliminated, and when production for export purposes, is not an essential factor; such as those of the secondary industries—finished products. With the unfinished products of the forests, fisheries, metalliferous mines, and to a great extent farms; a tax on such imports would not increase the prices of the home products; for in many cases the selling prices are regulated by the export prices, and when competition cannot be eliminated, supply and demand govern prices.

Bonusing System

Protection of the home market is affected, when the prices of the home products are maintained at a lower level than those of the imported articles. It is this economic principle that restricts importations, and not a tax on imports (tariff), for it may be made effective whether imports are taxed or not. When the prices of the home products are kept at the same level as those of similar imported articles, the taxing of imports (tariff) is simply a bonusing system, wherein the right to collect this tax is exercised by private persons; and the impost duty which in such cases is invariably paid by the consumers, presents no obstacle to importations. And when the duty is increased and prices are increased proportionately, importations are not thereby restricted.

Industrial Oligarchy

A high tariff, if effective, sets up an industrial oligarchy, which can maintain itself, because of its power to strangle the economic life of a country, and thus compel submission to its dictates. It is a high tax of a subtle character, which is imposed on consumers, whereby they are compelled to contribute to the support of industries in which they may have no pecuniary interest. A tariff, whether levied on imported wheat or shoes, is simply a tax, which may be included in the prices of the finished products, and this fact would become apparent by the drop in prices to the full extent of the tariff rate, in case it were suspended. It is sectional in application and only in a limited sense is it revenue producing.

An industry which can not prosper without a high tariff, does not belong here, and it is in the national interests, that its products be imported; for it acts as a parasite on the basic industries, upon which the economic life of the country depends.

He referred to Mr. Meighen's tariff policy, saying: "Back of this protectionist thought lies the desire of a few men of great wealth to get political control of the country. That the topic of real interest in Canada today was whether a few men who are very wealthy and who have certain established privileges, who reside for the most part in Eastern Canada and in Montreal more than anywhere else, whether these few men are going to succeed in getting political control in this country so that they can make the policies of Canada over to their monied interests and their selfish purposes."

Desire For Unity

If the Liberal Party has stood for one thing above another, said Premier Mackenzie King at a luncheon here yesterday, it has been to desire to unite the interests and bring about a harmony of policies which will benefit the whole of Canada.

Former M.P. "AT HOME"

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—The supreme court this morning dismissed with costs the appeal of the Premier Gold Mining Company against the Coastwise Steamship Company. The question involved the liability of the steamship company for the loss of the cargo of ore which involved a sum of \$17,500. The trial judge held that the loss was due to perils at sea and this view was upheld by the B.C. Court of Appeal.

LUMBER INDUSTRY IS PLANNED FOR SOUTH

Canadian Forest Products Ltd. Takes Over Beaver Cove Mill and Timber Limits

VICTORIA, Feb. 1.—Creation of a gigantic new lumber industry for British Columbia, backed by the millions of the International Harvester Company of America, is assured, starting this year, by the organization of the Canadian Forest Products, Ltd. It is announced. The company, with a capitalization of \$4,000,000, was authorized by the B.C. registrar of companies at Victoria, Saturday.

The concern which has been forced by the amalgamation of the Beaver Cove Lumber and Pulp Company and White Bros. Lumber Company, both of which own and control mill properties and vast timber limits on Vancouver Island, is being financed almost wholly by the International Harvester Company.

Creditors of the Beaver Cove Company, which firm has been defunct for several years, have been paid off, and final announcement of the reorganization was made yesterday.

Farris, Local Counsel

Wendell B. Farris, Vancouver, barrister, in whose hands the reorganization was placed, is in Chicago for the purpose of presenting his final organization report. In addition to discussing this report, the directors are making plans for immediate operation on a large scale.

Beaver Cove Company was a war venture which closed down some time ago, and left its large plant in idleness. The White Bros. Company, a Michigan concern, has been operating on a small scale.
