MALES PREDOMINATE MANITOBA PROVINCE

WINNIPEG, March 2. — The male population of Manitoba outnumbered the female population by more than 31,000, according to statistics compiled by the industrial development board in connection with its marketing survey of the prairie provinces. In Manitoba there are 320,567 males and 289,551 females. In Saskatchewan the figures show the male population predominating also the figures being 413,265 males and 343,457 females. In Alberta, the male boast a majority of 59,962.

HELIUM USED IN AIRSHIPS

Has Advantage of Not Being Inflammable but is Very Expensive

LONDON, Mar. 2. — The news that helium has been discovered in considerable quantities in Canada is gratifying. Hitherto the United States have had a monopoly of this rare gas, and the scarcity combined with the monopoly has kept the cost of it at a very high figure. This figure doubtless will now tend to drop, but it must be a very long time before helium can enter the lists as a commercial rival of hydrogen.

Helium may be described as a great undeveloped possibility. As an agent for lifting airships it is not known what future lies before it; it is not even certain that if helium were as plentiful and as cheap as hydrogen that British airship experts would elect to use it in commercial aircraft. Naval airship, would, of course, be a different matter.

Great Advantage

As a lifting agent helium has one very great advantage; it is non-inflammable. It has also one great drawback; it is less buoyant than hydrogen by about five per cent. Now when one is designing a commercial airship safety from fire is of supreme importance, and next in importance comes the capacity for lifting weight. It would be a serious matter for an airship company which hoped to pay dividend to have to sacrifice five per cent of its profitable cargo. If safety can be obtained without that sacrifice such a solution will be the most popular. In other words, if the inflammability of hydrogen can be discounted, then that gas is to be preferred to helium.

The Fire Danger

Major G. H. Scott and other British experts have stated many times, both publicly and in private, that the use of hydrogen in an airship is only dangerous when petrol is carried on the ship as fuel for the engines. There have, I believe, been only two cases in which British airships have caught fire in the air, but other countries have had more disasters of this kind. It is believed that in all the cases the fumes of the petrol first ignited and then set off the hydrogen. The most obvious safeguard, therefore, is to abolish petrol engines for airship use, and this is being done. As an additional precaution, though not an essential one, the bags of hydrogen can be surrounded with a layer of inert gas.

As for the danger from lightning, experts do not admit clear proof of a single airship (not excluding the Dixmude) every have been destroyed by lightning, and they do not admit the likelihood of such an event. The metal framework can be used as a safeguard. The Shenandoah was buffeted to pieces by a storm, not struck by lightning, but airships have no business to be in the centre of a violent storm.

MONTANA ELK USED AS BASIS OF FARM

BOSTON, March 2. — Elk breeding will soon become a new industry in Massachusetts. Three Boston men are on their way to Missoula, Mont., to bring back 450 cow elk which have been driven from their feeding ranges by storm and famine.

On their trip to Boston the elk will travel in palace stock cars. They will be turned loose on the Nemasket range at Middleboro, a 500-acre preserve, to which another 700 acres will be added if a herd of bull elk is imported later as planned.

Montana rangers sent word that the bull elk probably would drift into the Missoula corrals as their food shortage becomes more acute with the increase of winter snows. The bulls will be sent east to join the herd at Middleboro. Animal experts declared that the herd would thrive in New England climate and multiply in sufficient numbers to supply public parks as well as provide food for market.

The venture follows the offer of the United States Department of Agriculture to give the elk, which have been starving on snow and ice-covered ranges, to persons who would take adequate care of them.
