CHAMBER OF HORRORS ONLY PART LEFT OF A ONCE FAMOUS WAXWORKS

Madame Tussaud's Has Been Sold and will Probably Not be Rebuilt

LONDON, March 2.—Madame Tussaud's has been sold, but it is doubtful if the purchasers will rebuild the place as a waxworks exhibition. It is, indeed, unlikely. Most of the figures were lost in the fire last March; only the chamber of horrors and the tableaux on the lower floors escaped. The business was generally believed to have belonged to the Tussaud family, but the family had parted with their proprietary interest over half a century ago, when a private company was formed, most of the shares being held by trustees.

If the purchasers of the site do not revive the old exhibition they will lose the goodwill that went with the sale, for the public taste in waxworks can hardly be revived. It had been decaying for a long time, although Madame Tussaud's, as one of the traditional sights of London—better known, perhaps, to country visitors and visitors from the Dominions and America than to Londoners themselves—made a big fight. The waxworks in other big towns so popular with the past generations have nearly all disappeared, just as they have disappeared from the show-

MOTHERS TO BLAME FOR MANY DISEASES

So Says Eminent British Surgeon in an Interview

CHICAGO, Mar. 2.—Mothers of the twentieth century are to blame for the prevalence of cancer and other diseases caused by diet, Sir William Arbuthnot Lane, noted British surgeon, declared in an interview here.

"Our hospitals are crowded with patients suffering from cancer, rheumatism, tuberculosis and gastro-intestinal diseases," Sir William pointed out, adding his belief that all of these diseases are caused by improper feeding, impure food and air, and lack of hygienic knowledge.

"It is the fault of women in feeding their babies—in not teaching them the right habits," he declared. "It is the women who have failed in this civilization."

"There is convincing evidence that, if men will eat natural foods, adopt right habits, and take sufficient exercise, the diseases of civilization can be kept at bay. The primitive people never had these diseases, because they lived a natural life."

Sir William, who is one of the founders of the "New Health Society" of England came to Chicago in company with Dr. Philip Franklin, an American-born physician who has gained distinction in British medical circles. They visited the American College of Surgeons here and both delivered addresses Tuesday night before the Chicago Medical College.

Doctor Franklin echoed Sir William's advice, pointing to the precautions taken by primitive Indian mothers in caring for their babies.

MODERN GIRLS LIKE SOUTH SEA ISLANDERS

That is Suggestion of Anglican Archdeacon Given in Address at Toronto

TORONTO, Mar. 2.—The possibility of going backward instead of forward was impressed upon some 1,200 members of the Anglican Young People's Association by Ven. Archdeacon Follierington of Bramford at their annual rally, held under the auspices of the Toronto District Local Council, in St. John's Church.

In the name of progress, he said, girls had cut their hair and cut their skirts. Referring to the Parisian, the so-called leader in the way of fashion, the speaker said that they had to go back to the depth of civilization in Central Africa to find what they wore. In the name of progress the Parisian had only reached the same place the cannibal in the South Sea Islands was trying to get away from.

He believed that the ideal of their own Church of England was the right ideal for Canada. They believed in balanced progress. In conclusion the Archdeacon urged them to let their progress be sane and balanced.

OBJECTED TO WIFE SITTING LONG TIME ANOTHER MAN'S LAP

SEATTLE, March 2.—How long may a man's wife sit on the lap of another with propriety? Carl George Swanson thinks 15 minutes is too long a time and he so told his wife as well as Ben Johnson the gentleman with the offending knee. Now Carl is suing Ben, charging him with alienating his wife's affections, for which he thinks he should be paid liberally, at least \$15,000.

Testifying in the suit, Swanson said that his wife had sat on the other man's knee for as much as fifteen minutes at a time which he considered too long. A year ago this month Mrs. Swanson deserted him he said and it was all because of Johnson. He said they had married in Juneau in 1915 and that all had gone well until Johnson came between them.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditions upon residence, occupation and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 3,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stampage.

HOMESTEAD LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranging, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, cowboys and travellers, up to ten head.
