# IMMIGRATION FROM STATES

### Homeseekers' Parties at Low Fares to be Carried Twice Monthly to Prairies

WINNIPEG, Jan. 12.—Preparing for an extensive movement of homeseekers from the United States announcement was made today that the Canadian National Railways will have in effect during the coming year homeseekers' fares applying to the territory west of Omaha and east of Central Indiana, including points in the states of Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin and certain points in Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and South Dakota.

Prevailing high rental charges for farms in these states are causing farmers to look toward Canada with more and more interest. Dan M. Johnson, western manager of colonization and immigration, stated this morning. Inquiries reaching the offices of the company at American points indicate that there will probably be a greater movement of American farmers toward Canada during the present year than since the war. Mr. Johnson stated. The parties of Nebraska farmers brought over last fall, a large number of whom purchased Saskatchewan land, have been boosting Canada ever since their return to their own states, and the splendid crop of 1925 has had the effect of focusing attention on the west to a greater extent than for many years.

Farmers with growing families across the line, find the cost of land so high that they are compelled to look toward Canadian prairies when they wish to expand their holdings. Mr. Johnson stated.

# WOLVES ATTACK FUR DEALER

### Three of Dogs Killed and Four Pelts of Siam Wolves Turned Over to Government

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—A special from Cobalt to the Evening Journal says: "Attacked by wolves in the depths of the Quebec bush and saved from death only by the sacrifice of his sleigh dogs, Geo. Benson, of Hamilton, Ont., well-known fur buyer, was brought to the hospital here with his speech temporarily lost and suffering from other effects of his experience. He is recovering."

Three of his four dogs were killed in a pitched battle with the wolves, Benson says, and on the survivor fell the onus of hauling his master back to civilization together with a valuable load of furs picked up during his trip.

There were between fifteen and eighteen wolves in the pack, which swooped down upon Benson and his dogs about half past three in the afternoon, when the little company was in the vicinity of Bass Lake, 80 miles beyond North Temiskaming.

### Wolves Retreat

Benson was armed with a rifle and hatchet, and when the leader of the pack, a big fellow, jumped for him, he fired, bringing it down dead in the snow. While the attention of the others was thus diverted, the fur buyer unloosed three of his sleigh dogs, and a general melee ensued. In the confusion, Benson slipped behind a tree and while the animals fought, he brought down three more wolves with his rifle. In the battle the dogs were slain, but the wolves finally retreated into the bush.

Benson skinned the four wolves and will turn the skins over to the government. With the surviving dog, he started for North Temiskaming, the long animal hauling the big load of provisions and furs valued at \$1,800.

### Second Time Attacked

Travelling for two days and nights through the bush he managed to reach Clark's farm, a distance of 60 miles. From Clark's place Benson secured a team and drove into North Temiskaming and afterwards coming here for treatment. Two years ago when in the same locality he was attacked by the wolves at night, but escaped by waving his flashlight.

"Benson has been trapping and buying furs in the north for the past 18 years."
