Terrace Parent-Teachers Hear Address and Listen to Music at Last Meeting

TERRACE, April 17.—The regular monthly meeting of the Parent Teachers' Association was held on Wednesday evening in the school house with the largest attendance of any meeting since the association was organized.

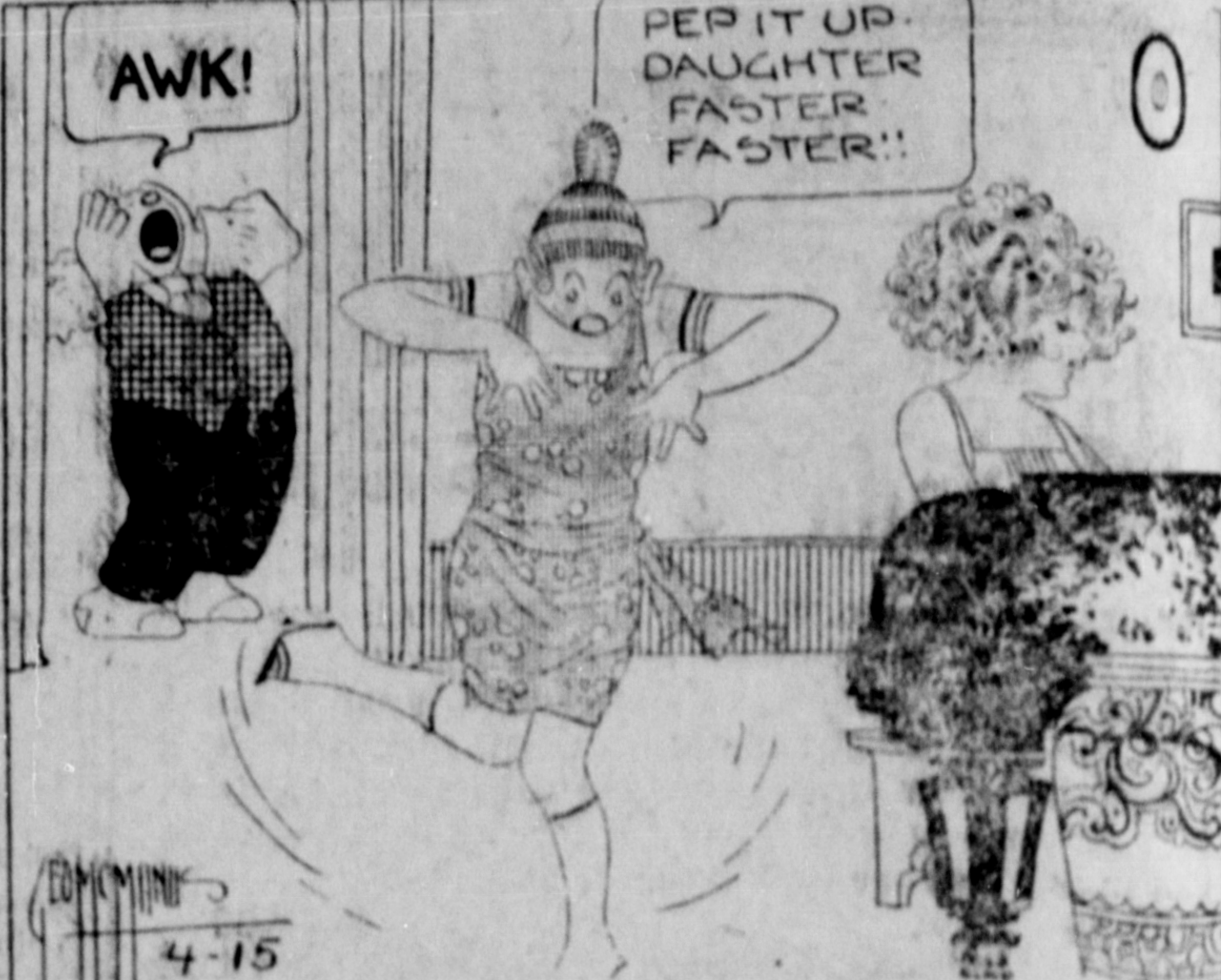

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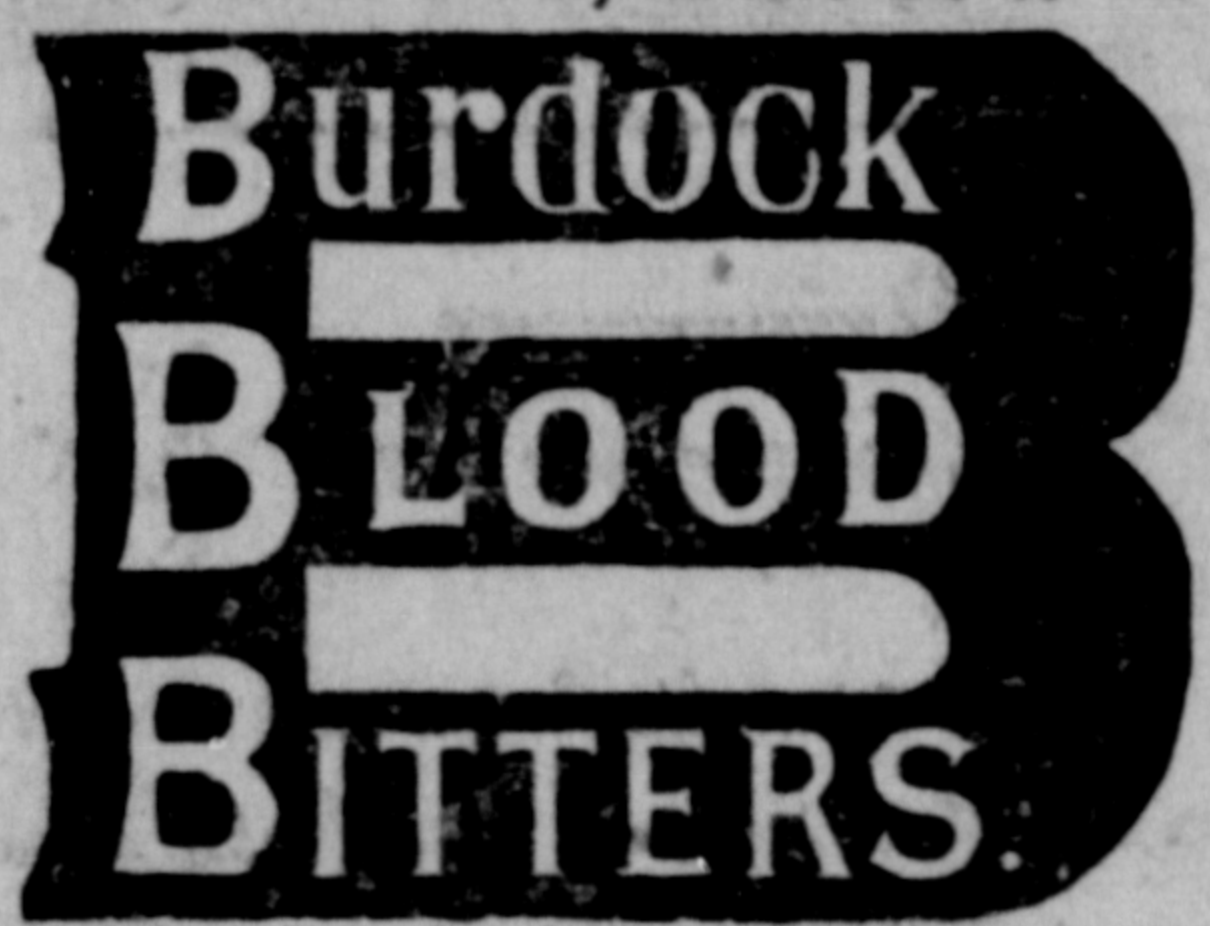

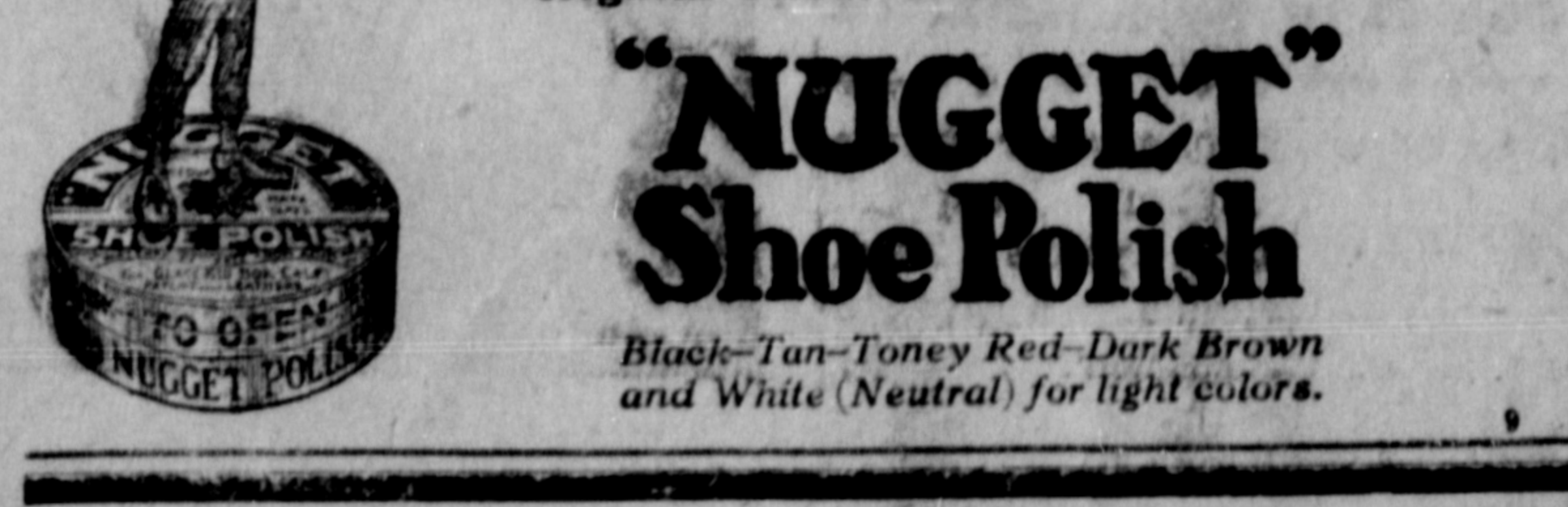
