

WORKING BOND M.K. GROUP OF MINING CLAIMS

Property Near Pacific Taken by Duke Harris and Associates and Ore Being Shipped

The Northern Prospecting & Development Co. has taken a lease and bond on the M.K. group of claims up Legate Creek from Pacific from Mack Orr and associates and has already started work on the property stated W. S. (Duke) Harris, well known Hazelton mining man and principal of the company, who was in town at the end of the week to meet his brother, Al Harris, who was here on Saturday enroute to Stewart to examine a mining property. There is already 100 tons of ore from the M.K. group awaiting shipment stated Mr. Harris.

Under Mr. Harris' supervision, work is continuing on the Silver, Cap, Hazelton View and Sunrise properties at Hazelton, the first two of which mines are now shipping ore. The late departure of snow from the interior mountains is to some extent hampering the progress of work on some of the higher mining properties.

PRESENTATION MADE MR. AND MRS. VICKERS


Number of Old Friends Called on Them Yesterday and Expressed Good Wishes on Leaving

IMMIGRANTS FOR CANADA

Arrivals Over Week-end Numbered 1840 Most of Whom Come West

WINNIPEG, June 7.—More than 1,840 new comers to Canada arrived at Halifax and Quebec over the week-end and are proceeding to their new Canadian homes over the lines of the Canadian National Railways, according to information received from the headquarters of the colonization department at Montreal. Three steamers landing their passengers at Quebec brought 1,425 of the total, the balance being on three steamers touching at Halifax and carrying 355. A large percentage of the new arrivals are destined for the prairie provinces. The new comers from the British Isles arrived at Quebec on the Regina, the Athenia and the Alania.

Included among the settlers on the Athenia are several interesting parties. One of these is a special party under the auspices of the department of colonization and natural resources of the Canadian National Railways numbering 347 individuals and travelling under the direction of Alexander McCowan of Glasgow, superintendent for Scotland of the department. A number of families and farm workers of experienced character are travelling with the party conducted by Mr. McCowan.

VICTORIA IS TAXED HIGHEST IN DOMINION

TORONTO, June 5.—Victoria, B.C., with a per capita tax of \$132.33 is the most heavily taxed city in the Dominion, according to a report of the Canadian research institute, Charlotte-town, is the lowest with \$58.36. Western cities are heaviest tax burdened, the report states.


