Former Major Louis Livingston Seaman, who has served in every American campaign since the Spanish American war and in the armies of Japan and Belgium, sees in the development of chemical warfare a new enemy for the medical world to tackle. Soldiers' wounds in future wars, said the 76year-old veteran, probably will be of a nature little known today.
