Arrangements were completed for the lecture to be given on "Canadianizing Canada" in the First United Church next Monday by Walter McEay, the well known orator and traveler, and it was decided to invite Henri Bourassa of Montreal, Nationalist M.P., to speak in Prince Rupert under the auspices of the Native Sons during his trip to the Pacific Coast this year after the parliamentary session closes.
