MINIMUM WAGE BOARD FINAL INVESTIGATION INTO LUMBER INDUSTRY

VICTORIA, April 13.—Final investigations into the condition of British Columbia's lumber industry and the wages paid to its employees will be made by the board administering the new provincial minimum wage law during the next few weeks. After conferring with representatives of the Coast lumber industry during the next few days, the board will go into the interior about April 20 to meet members of the Mountain Lumbermen's Association and find out what wages are paid in their mills.

With these inquiries complete, the board will be ready to enforce minimum wages in the lumbering industry around June 1, it is expected. A definite date on which lumbermen must pay a set minimum wage will be fixed shortly.

The board so far has made no decision on the amount of the wage to be enforced in the lumber industry. It is generally thought, however, that it will be approximately forty cents an hour. While the lumber industry will be the first to feel the effect of the new law, it will be extended in scope to include all industries later.

A BYLAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXEMPTION OF A GRAIN ELEVATOR, BUILDINGS, WHARVES, CONVEYERS AND IMPROVEMENTS AND THE LANDS UPON WHICH THE SAME ARE SITUATE IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT FROM MUNICIPAL TAXATION.

BYLAW No. 1
A BYLAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXEMPTION OF A GRAIN ELEVATOR, BUILDINGS, WHARVES, CONVEYERS AND IMPROVEMENTS AND THE LANDS UPON WHICH THE SAME ARE SITUATE IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT FROM MUNICIPAL TAXATION.

WHEREAS the Canadian Wheat Producers Limited (hereinafter called the company) have requested the Council of the City of Prince Rupert (hereinafter called the Council) to submit to the ratepayers of the said City, entitled to vote thereon, a bylaw for the consent of such ratepayers to the exemption from municipal taxation of the grain elevator, buildings, wharves, conveyers and the land upon which the same are situate, and held by the said company under a lease from His Majesty the King in the Right of the Dominion of Canada, in consideration of the said company operating the said elevator during the term of the said lease, and such further term as is hereinafter more particularly specified.

AND WHEREAS the said Council of the said City deem it conducive to the welfare of the City to encourage the operation of the said grain elevator in the said City.

NOW THEREFORE IN CONSIDERATION OF THE PREMISES THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That in consideration of the Canadian Wheat Producers Limited forthwith proceeding to operate the grain elevator on that parcel of land hereinafter described during the term hereinafter mentioned, the grain elevator, buildings, wharves, conveyers and improvements thereon erected on the 29.5 acres of waterfront bounded on the south-west by City water front on the south-east by the right of way of the Canadian National Railway, and on the north-east by a line drawn parallel to and 1500 feet north-easterly from the south-west boundary, and all such land shall be fully exempt from municipal taxation for a period of two years from the 1st day of January, 1926, and in the event of the said company, its successors and assigns, obtaining an extension of the lease of the said elevator during such further term, then such further term, and in the event of the company, its successors and assigns, purchasing such elevator and operating the same then such elevator shall be exempt for a period of ten years but not further.

2. It is distinctly understood and the intention of this bylaw is that the property hereby exempted shall only continue during such period as such property is held and owned by the company, its successors and assigns, and in the event of such company, its successors and assigns, ceasing to operate the same the exemption from taxation hereby granted shall cease and the same shall thereupon become again subject to assessment and taxation.

3. This bylaw shall not come into force or take effect until it has been submitted to the electors of the municipality entitled to vote upon bylaws to contract a debt and has received the assent of not less than three-fifths of the number of the electors who shall vote upon such bylaw.
