Difficult Problem Of Financing.

Financing a nation is a difficult work. British Columbia has her problems and the Dominion hers. They are as nothing, however, to the problems faced by the little island of Great Britain where the debt, mostly incurred by war, amounts to seven and a half billion pounds sterling and the income to be raised in the year amounts to about four billion dollars.

Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer in that country, has been wrestling with the problems of governmental financing and announces that last year there would have been a surplus of five million pounds had it not been for the coal subsidy, which it is understood is to be dropped. This coal subsidy caused a deficit of about seventy million dollars. It was imposed in order to prevent a coal strike a year ago.

France Will Begin To Pay War Debt.

France is to begin paying her war debt to Great Britain this year, the chancellor of the exchequer announced in his budget speech yesterday. It is rather a belated beginning for France is not taxed as heavily as Britain but it also must be remembered that France was decimated by the invaders and suffered as no other nation in the war suffered, except Belgium.

Britain is repaying her debt to United States and with France paying her indebtedness, the world seems in a fair way to settling up old accounts without danger of friction.

Indians Differ From Other Races.

Indians differ from most other races in that while they imitate others and are keen to get away from and forget their old nationality most peoples are keen on retaining their national language and characteristics. In another place today is an article published in Sunday's Province, which intimates that the Indians are being absorbed by the white races and will eventually disappear. That probably will be their fate. Already there are many natives in whom white blood is apparent and a good many have intermarried with white people.

Pity To Lose Indian Handicrafts.

It seems a pity that the Indian handicrafts should be lost. These are distinctive and artistic. The basketwork is wonderful and some of the carving excellent. The native patterns are different from any other and should be retained. Possibly one of the native men or women will have a turn for literature and write the history of the Indian people injecting into it their own atmosphere and legends and it may be permeated with their own aims, aspirations and ideals.

There is something very sordid about the aims and aspirations of most white people and we may learn much from study of the natives. After all, there is something more in life than the pursuit of wealth, the race for pleasure, the building and furnishing of fine houses and the life of eternal jazz.

WORK ON TOTEM PARK GOES ON

Cinder Paths Practically Completed Today and Pole Will be up Very Soon

The work of finishing the cinder paths to the top of the little hill overlooking the Canadian National general offices and of levelling off the top prior to the erection of the totem pole on Second Avenue will be practically completed today. A gang of men has been engaged there yesterday and today under foreman Alger of Usk carrying the cinders up in sacks and quite a transformation has been wrought in the place.

A rock gang under Nat Pederson is blasting a hole for the foundation of the pole and the work will be completed within a few days, it is expected. It will be put right through without further delay.

Resort for Tourists

The totem was painted in the natural Indian colors last fall and is all ready and when erected will prove to be one of the landmarks of the city and a great resort for tourists. The pole is not being placed quite at the top of the knoll but slightly to the northeast so that visitors standing on the top will be able to photograph it to advantage.

The view from the hill is a splendid one and the place will eventually form one of the prettiest little parks on the continent.

While the work being done this year provides only for the building of the walks, levelling the top and erecting the totem pole on a concrete base, the work and expense involved in that is considerable but is money well spent. It will be a great acquisition to the town.

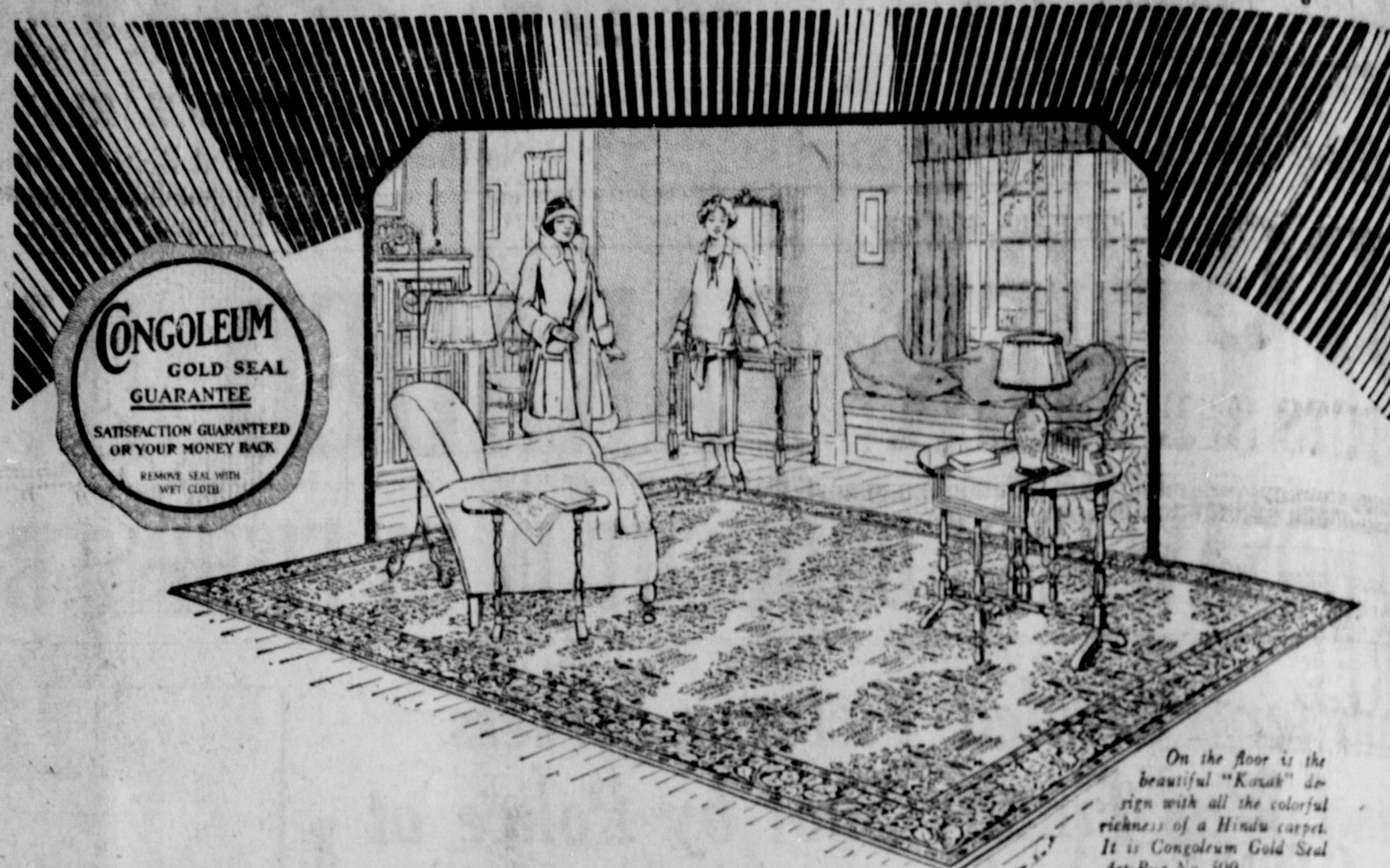
