LONDON, November 27.—"Speaking for the Dominion of Canada," declared Premier Mackenzie King, at a farewell dinner given to the premiers of the Dominions by the Empire Parliamentary Association in the Royal Gallery of the House of Lords last night, "I can say that the pride of our people in the achievements of the Imperial Conference in respect to Canada's relations in domestic and external affairs, will be not in what has been gained but in the fact that what has been attained is now no longer open to debate. #### MANSON TELLS COMMISSION OF SMUGGLING

EVASION OF LAW LEADS TO DEATH FROM HI-JACKING AND MURDER

VICTORIA, Nov. 27.—"Sometimes one can be fooled by members of parliament out here and give them credit for knowledge of the situation," declared Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, before the customs commission in discussing liquor smuggling. "Checking the liquor export houses, I have declared that under the law at present, liquor was shipped for export to Mexico and also to Windsor, which the latter seemed 'like carrying coals to Newcastle.'" He mentioned a vessel which had made three trips to Mexico within 36 hours and produced landing certificates showing it had arrived at its Mexican destination. Deaths from hi-jacking and other results from evasion of the law in the matter of liquor smuggling, he maintained.

#### RUMANIAN KING SERIOUSLY ILL

QUEEN MARIE HURRYING HOME AND CANCER SPECIALIST VISITS BUCHAREST

BELOGRADE, Nov. 27.—Reports received here from Bucharest say King Ferdinand's condition is hopeless. His illness has reached a final stage. The situation in Rumania is politically reported to be alarming. Reports state that Queen Marie, who is now staying homeward, will stop at Paris a day to confer with her eldest son and relative to the propriety of his going to his father's bedside if Ferdinand's condition should permit. A despatch from Paris states that Professor Lézine, a surgeon and cancer specialist, left there today for Bucharest to examine the King.

#### TOLMIE WILL NOT RESIGN

VANCOUVER, Nov. 27.—Hon. S. F. Tolmie, the newly appointed leader of the Conservative party for British Columbia, arrived here this morning from the Kamloops convention. It is understood that he will not immediately resign his federal seat but that R. H. Pooley will continue to lead the House at the approaching session. Dr. Tolmie will likely accept the offer to contest Saanich when the time comes, Coventry resigning.

#### OGDEN POINT DOCK AT VICTORIA WILL BE USED DECEMBER

It is planned to have all the railway tracks completed and the cars in the yard for the handling of this big consignment of overland freight.

#### WILL TRANSSHIP TO VANCOUVER

The oranges, instead of being transhipped to Vancouver by coastwise steamer, will be loaded here by Victoria longshoremen into the cars and taken to Vancouver by car ferry via Patricia Bay and Port Mann over the C.N.R. lines. Outward bound, the President Grant is expected to be the first vessel to load lumber for the Orient from Victoria's lumber assembly plant, which will be in operation by then.

#### GOOD ADVICE GIVEN BOYS

(Victoria Colonist)

Sound advice to schoolboys is contained in an address delivered by Sir Abe Bailey at the Keighley Boys' Grammar School, the school which he attended fifty years ago. His advice is terse and to the point and of benefit to boys wherever they are all over the Empire. "Do not neglect," he says, "your outdoor games, for games are great moral training and character developers, as well as great physical training. Remember mental power, like muscular strength, will grow with exercise." Sir Abe believes that the old fibre of England is still to be found among her schoolboys and is as enduring as ever. Here is the summing up of his advice:

Remember there are such things as luck, but luck means hard work. Many people persuade themselves, though not others, that they work hard—a man who will not work in the future will be one too many for England. Bear in mind it is a great advantage to start life with nothing, for then you have nothing to lose. You can all succeed if you will—if your will is the condition.

Try to mark the page in which you live, remembering every individual is a teacher for good or evil. Attempt to order your own destiny; opportunities are sometimes made, sometimes given—no man can make sure his desired opportunity will come—but every man can make sure that he will be ready for it when it comes.

Have grit and courage in your troubles, but sympathy for others when in trouble. Let your watchword be service. Each one must render individual service in order to maintain our Empire. Problems are handed on to you to maintain the life and integrity of the nation, and the great traditions of the past, and bear in mind you pass through this world only once, and that you are the trustees of the Nation's and Empire's title deeds, and should you neglect your duty you will not get another chance, for you will not pass this way again.

#### CANADIAN IN ENGLAND ACQUITTED OF MURDER

MAIDSTONE, England, Nov. 27.—Alphonse Smith, former British Columbian, grandson of Hugh Ryan, Canadian railway builder, was acquitted of the charge of murder brought against him as a result of the death of John Derham. Smith was sentenced to twelve months imprisonment for carrying a loaded revolver.

#### Witness in Drug Smuggling Case Won Confidence of the Leaders of Gang to Land Them

VANCOUVER, November 27.—When the trial was resumed in the police court yesterday afternoon of the case of three Italians and three Chinese who are charged with being members of a narcotic drug-smuggling ring, Verne A. Partlow, the chief witness for the customs department, declared he won the confidence of Charles Marino, now in the penitentiary, and became a member of what he declared to be a drug smuggling gang, solely for the purpose of bringing the principals to justice. He had no hope of reward, he said, neither did he expect anything on turning the information over to the customs officers.

"I did this because I have no use for a man who smuggles or handles dope," he said.

The case is proceeding.

#### SPEED BOAT WITH LIQUOR IS CAPTURED

THREE MILE CHASE IN WHICH MACHINE GUNS AND RIFLES ARE USED

SEATTLE, Nov. 27.—After a three mile chase in which machine gun and rifle fire raked the decks of speed boat 279, that vessel surrendered to United States coast-guard picket boat 2354 off Shannan Point, three miles from Anacortes while bound from Vancouver to Seattle.

Fred Robertson of Victoria and Chester Reece were in charge of the boat. It was admitted that the two companions tossed 91 sacks of liquor overboard, nine sacks of bonded liquor being found on the craft and five others were retrieved from the water.

#### Election Petition for Yukon Filed Against Captain George Black on Corruption Charges

VANCOUVER, November 27.—Captain George Black, member-elect for the Yukon in the Federal Parliament, was advised in a wire from Dawson that a petition was filed there Thursday alleging agents and supporters committed illegal and corrupt acts in connection with his election.

Captain Black, who defeated Fred Congdon, the Liberal, by a majority of approximately 175, declared here that there was nothing in the charges. He would fight the action to a finish under the law. Captain Black stated that the court to try an election petition in Yukon elections would take place at Yukon Territory sittings with a judge of the appeal or supreme court during the session of parliament, the trial could not take place before summer.

#### Seized Liquor Did Not Reach Destination is Statement of Officer

VICTORIA, November 27.—Shipments of thousands of cases of liquor were cleared for Mexico, Guatemala and Nicaragua which in his opinion never were intended to reach their destination, according to F. V. Davie, collector of customs of the City of Victoria, before the customs commission Friday evening.

Davie told of a shipment of 13,000 cases from Victoria aboard the Prince Albert for Guatemala in the summer of 1924 after a bond had been given that the cargo would be landed outside Canada. Later some of the shipment had been found aboard the "Eva B" which had been seized.

#### PUBLICITY FOR COAST CITIES

FIVE LIKELY TO JOIN EFFORTS TO BRING TOURISTS FROM OUTSIDE

VICTORIA, Nov. 27.—Proposals to spend \$100,000 for advertising Seattle, Vancouver, Tacoma, Victoria and Bellingham, will be considered at the annual meeting of the Puget Sounders and British Columbians Associated, to be held in Victoria next month.

The sum of \$33,000 was contributed to a community fund by the five cities interested last year and the success of the campaign has led to the proposal for the big increase. Co-operation will also be offered to the South Washington Hotelmen's Association in their \$25,000 advertising campaign of the same territory.

Plans were briefly outlined at a meeting of Puget Sounders and British Columbians Associated held in Seattle Saturday. R. H. B. Ker, chairman of the Victoria and Island Publicity Bureau; George I. Warren, Publicity Commissioner, and Stephen Jones of Victoria, representing this city. Fred Crone, Vancouver, president of the joint organization, presided.

Although Victoria and Vancouver delegates were not in a position to pledge their cities for the three-fold increase of their subscriptions they were evidently impressed with the proposal. On a population basis Victoria's subscription would be \$6,600, which would mean doubling the amount paid into the general fund and transferring \$2,000 contributed to the British Columbia prairie fund to the \$100,000 fund.

#### LOOPHOLE FOR NEGOTIATIONS

MAY BE FURTHER CONFERENCE BEFORE RAILWAYMEN'S STRIKE GOES INTO EFFECT

MONTREAL, Nov. 27.—An apparent loophole for further negotiations between the Canadian Railways and the conductors and trainmen is left in a statement issued today by the managers' committee of the railways. After a reference to the sitting of the conciliation board on the wage dispute in question, the statement concludes: "It did not seem therefore that any useful purpose could be accomplished by further negotiations between committees which heretofore had failed to reach an agreement especially in view of the report of the board which had been appointed by the committee."

However the manager's committee further intimated that they assumed before reaching any conclusion the employees representatives would desire to confer further with the railway executives.

#### ALIENATION OF AFFECTIONS

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN COURT CASE AT REVELSTOKE ON CLAIM FOR \$100,000

REVELSTOKE, Nov. 27.—Mr. Justice Murphy reserved his decision after the supreme court hearing here in a suit for \$100,000 damages brought in the Supreme Court against John Powles by Harold Forester, both of Willmar, for alienation of the affections of Forester's wife by defendant.

#### WHITE STAR LINE IS SOLD

ACQUIRED BY THE ROYAL MAIL PACKET COMPANY FOR \$35,000,000

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The Royal Mail Packet Company announced today that arrangements had been concluded whereby they acquire the whole of the capital share of the White Star line on January 1. The price to be paid is approximately \$35,000,000 for the 500,000 ton fleet which includes some of the finest liners afloat.

#### INDIAN KILLED BY YOUNG LAD

DUTCH HARBOR, Nov. 27.—Egnatz Popoff, an Indian, was shot and killed by a seventeen-year-old boy whom he had adopted, federal officials reported here. Last night, on their return from Biorka village in which they were staying, the youth is said to have admitted killing Popoff. The authorities reported that they were told the shooting took place during a general drunken celebration of a successful fishing and whaling season.

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
