

California and Arizona

Starting from Seattle on Novmber 28, Mr. Starr, accompanied by Mrs. Starr drove throug. geles. Imperial Valley and other points of interest. The Imperial Valley is below sea level and since it has been irrigated has been producing cotton, oranges, grape fruit, figs and dates and other sub-tropical products. It is irrigated from the Colorado

Another irrigated country was passed through in Arizona where the products were mostly alfalfa. cotton and winter vegetables. He saw the vast irrigation works. such as the Gillespie dam and the Roosevelt dam. The effect of water on the sandy soil was marvellous, making it wonderfully productive. In southern Arizona he visited the copper mines Texas where cactus trees grew 35 to 40 feet high and so many angora goals were raised that the country controlled the mohair crop of the world.

Interesting Details

In describing the drive through the country, Mr. Starr told interesting details such as the absence of culverts across the roads, the "bumper gates" which they passed through without getling out of the car, the miniature mountains they passed with their tops flat as a table, hundreds of them ranging in height from 50 to 200 or 300 feet high. Then they came into the timbered country and the districts of natural oil and on to Galveston with its enormous sea wall on which they depend for future safety. In that district they found a lot of mud and an absence of hard

surfaced roads. New Orleans was an in teresting city divided into three sections, the modern city, the French section and the Negro! quarter. Canal street is a fine thoroughfare with four street car tracks but in the French section the streets are very narrow! and the two or three storey buildings overhang on either

Louisiana and Missippi seemed to be fertile with cotton and sugar cane as the chief products. The negroes there live chiefly on chewing sugar cane and eating corn bread and sweet potatoes. White potatoes were rare. . .

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
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
