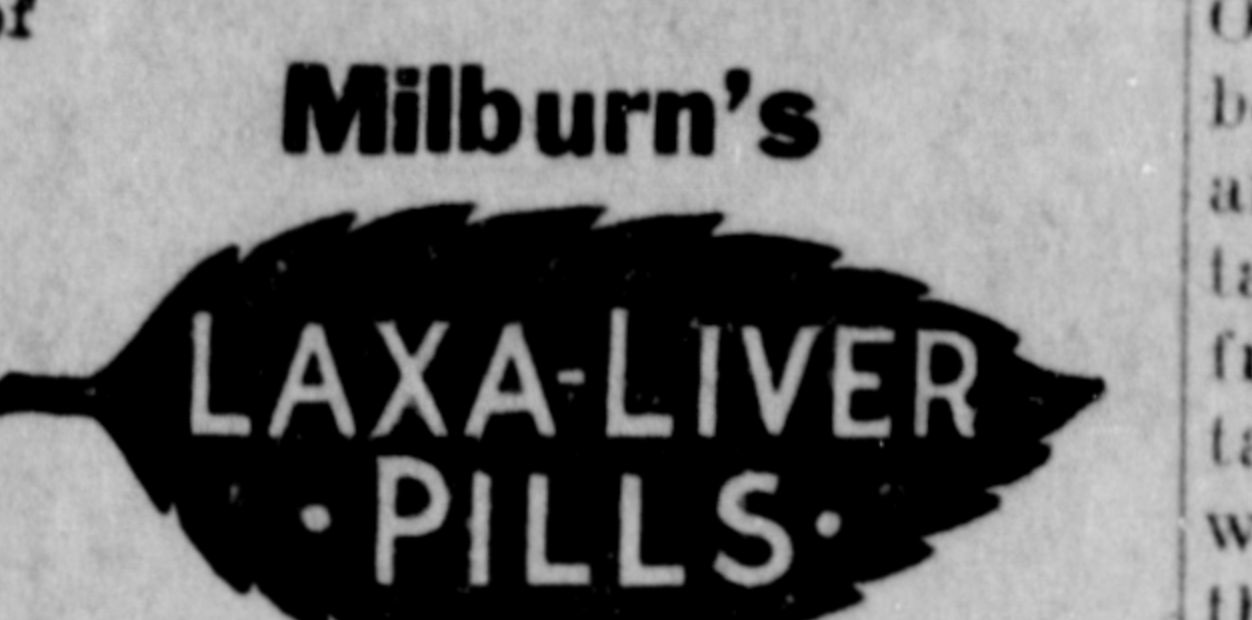

putation from the Northern Alberta Game and Protective League that came before the agricultural committee of the house. Present measures and methods of protection are inadequate, claimed Dr. R. A. Rooney, who was spokesman for the party, and inasmuch as the wild game all over Canada is a great national asset it should be given more and better care.

George Mills, Liberal member for Athabaska, took exception to the implication that Alberta's game protection is poor. He said he had found the laws very good and very well enforced, and he also objected to putting the blame for over-hunting on the Indians, for his own experience had been that white men are the worst offenders.

Hon. George Hoadley declared that strict game protection and enforcement is a gigantic proposition and that in spite of all the efforts that can be made a great deal of game destruction will take place, because of the large area to cover.

Some Species in Danger
Particular mention was made by Dr. Rooney of the danger of killing out elk and some of the birds, such as ruffed grouse, in this province. Immediate steps should be taken, he thought, to save the remnant of elk in the Brazeau country, and in the case of the ruffed grouse, which are now in a serious condition through both excessive shooting and disease, he recommended a close season this year.
It was the feeling of the Protective League that 25 per cent of all game licenses fees should be set aside for game protection and propagation and that for the enforcement of the Game Act there should be permanent salaried guardians, with also an increase in the fine for minor infringements to \$50.

Bears are Prized
Dr. Rooney told the committee that as a matter of courtesy exchange it is desirable that the fees for non-resident hunting licenses to hunters from other provinces should be on the same basis as charged in those provinces to non-residents. He also had a good word to say for the bears, which he thought have been unjustly penalized. Both black and grizzly bears are greatly prized game and are not nearly so injurious to other life as supposed. A close season from June to September was recommended.

BIG BOAT RACE ON SATURDAY

Oxford and Cambridge Will Compete in Historic Event for 78th Time

LONDON, March 24.—One of the big sport events of the year to Londoners and others, the Oxford-Cambridge University boat race on the Thames, which annually draws crowds of spectators estimated all the way from 500,000 to 1,000,000 will take place on Saturday. This will be the 78th race between the Dark Blue (Oxford) and the Light Blue (Cambridge) and as usual keen interest is being shown in the coming contest.

The race last year was disappointing in the fact that there was a cold wind which churned the water up to such an extent that the Oxford boat became water-logged and the Dark Blue was unable to remain in the contest to the end. The Thames was very rough, especially on the south or Surrey side, which the Oxford crew perforce had to take because Cambridge won the loss and chose the Middlesex or north shore, which furnished some protection from the biting wind. Cambridge finished the race alone, the time being 21 minutes and 51 seconds, slower than usual but regarded as creditable in view of the wind and water conditions.

The course, from Putney to Mortlake is 4 1/4 miles. Cambridge's victory last year was the 36th win for the Light Blue, four less than that of Oxford. Cambridge was the general favorite before the 1925 race. The 1877 race resulted in a tie. Since the war Cambridge has won every race except one, Oxford being victorious in 1923. During the war the annual inter-university boat races were suspended.

NOMINATIONS AT KETCHIKAN

Harry Nunan Formerly of Prince Rupert Among Those Aspiring to Mayoralty

KETCHIKAN, B.C., March 24.—Harry Nunan, formerly of Prince Rupert is among those nominated here for the mayoralty this year. Thirty-nine persons were nominated to be candidates for municipal offices at a caucus at the council chamber. Seven were named to enter the race for mayor, including Thomas Torry, present incumbent. Twenty-one nominations were made to fill three places on the city council, while eleven were named for one vacancy on the school board.

Filings for the various offices will close March 31 at 5 p.m. Registration for the April 6 election will end at 4 p.m. April 3, according to an announcement by J. E. Johnson, city clerk. Nominees and the offices for which they were named are as follows:

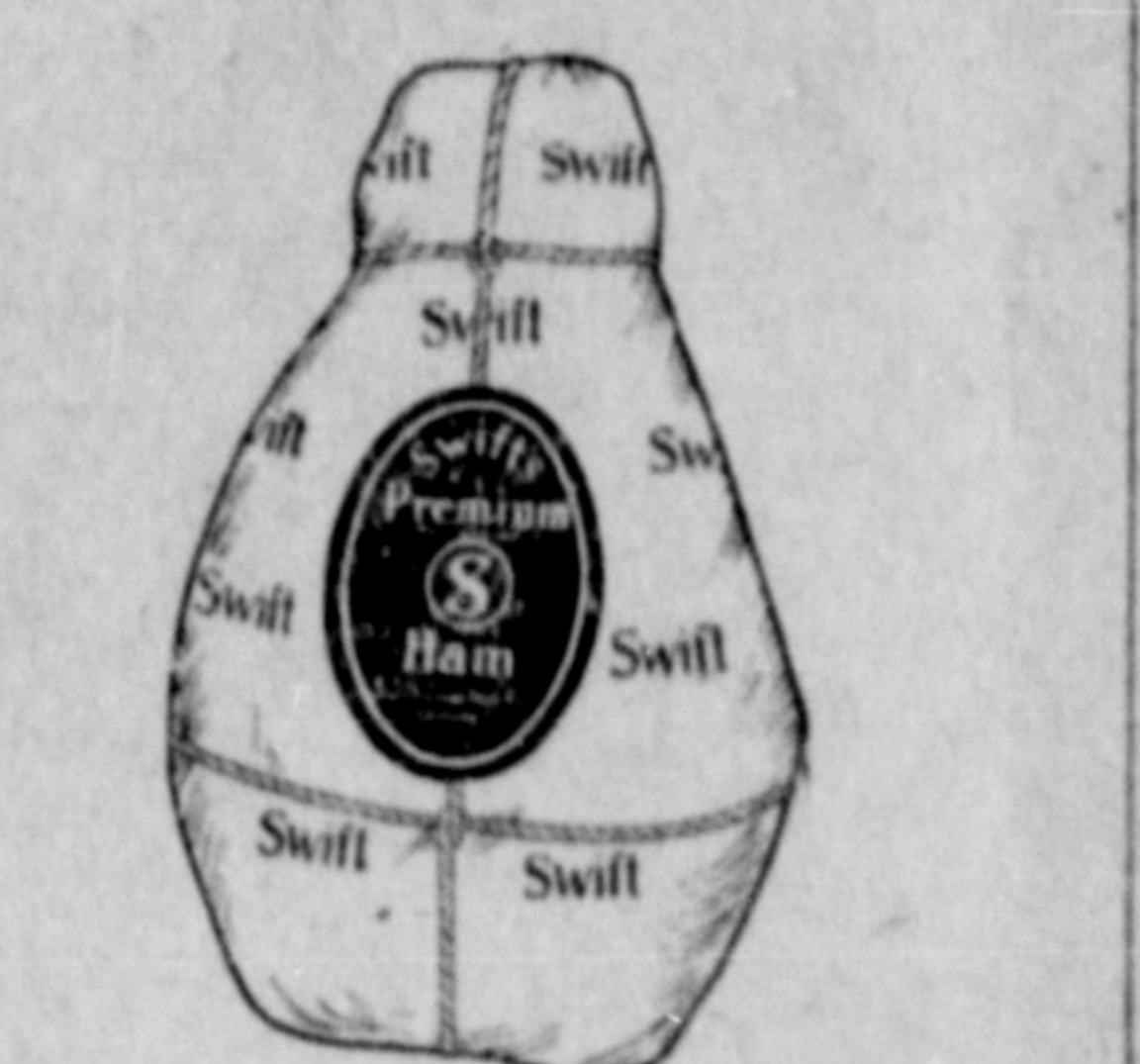

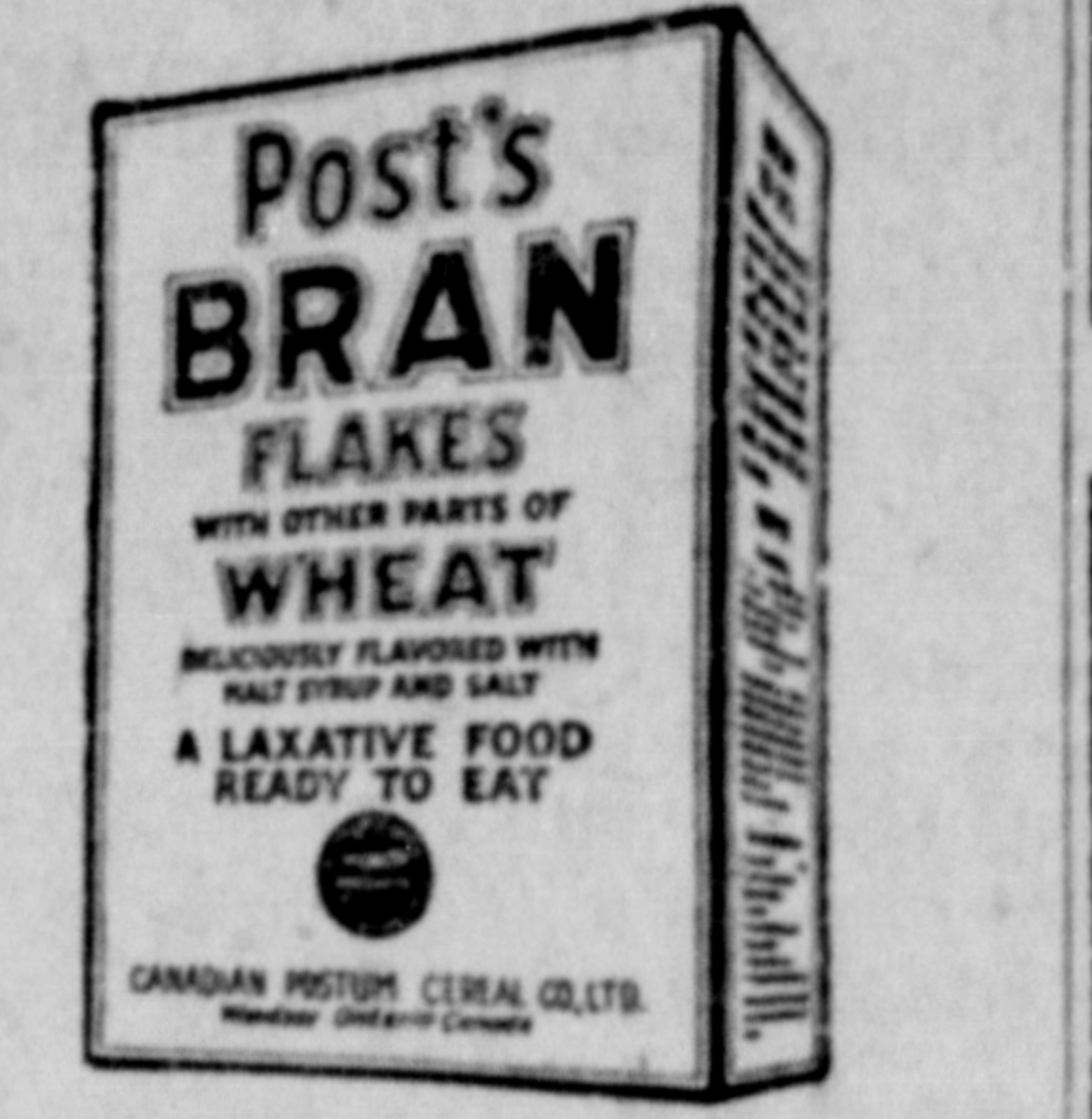
