It was moved by Stanley W. Taylor and seconded by Mayor S. M. Newson, that a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to Capt. G. F. Morris for his very successful work in Prince Rupert. Captain Morris, in reply, expressed his thanks to the members of the committee for their co-operation and the citizens in general for their many kindnesses and the splendid response to his appeal for contributions.
