PRISON YOUTHS LEARN CRIMES

Warns Others Against Life of Selfishness as he goes to Gallows

WINNIPEG, Man., Mar. 3.—(By Canadian Press)—"Within prison walls many future crimes are planned and youths, most of them first offenders, are taught by older and hardened criminals that they will succeed the next time."

This was the charge of John Stanton Baker, convicted murderer of 70-year-old John Penny of Winnipeg, in his last message written while awaiting execution of his death sentence which was carried out here.

The contents of the message are made public by Rev. George A. Woodside, who acted as spiritual adviser to the condemned man.

"I want to warn others," Stanton wrote, "lest they follow in my footsteps. All I ever did was without the desire to do wrong but rather to serve my own selfish purposes. Self-preservation was the only law knew. I didn't know the difference between right and wrong. I was following the path of least resistance."

First Conviction

Stanton spoke of his first conviction and freedom. He had sought to go straight and looked for employment. When he had answered truthfully questions put to him, he was told that "jail-birds" were not wanted. When he lied and got work, he was found out and discharged. Wherever he went, the stigma of

crime pursued him.

"It seemed," he said, "as if every door was shut against me except the door of vice and crime."

"What would I do if I got my freedom again? I believe I would live a Christian life and try and help those down and out to see the error of their way as I never saw it until now."

In assailing capital punishment Mr. Woodside maintained it was a "blot on the escutcheon of our civilization," and the sooner abolished, the better.

"It is a thousand-fold more horrible, however, when we look at the causes of which it is the consequence," Mr. Woodside said. "If we are to remove it effectively, we must strain our sinews as a Christian nation to abolish the cause. There is only one cure for crime. The human heart must be regenerated."

Mr. Woodside blamed the parents for the delinquency among children. The mothers and fathers, he thought, should train their children in the difference between right and wrong; they should take greater interest in them, be companions to them and watch their amusements.

"Don't wait until you are confronted with a terrible calamity before you give thought to the child," he implored.

CHURCH PASTOR BIDS FAREWELL

Rev. P. E. Baisler Presided at His Last Meeting of St. Paul's Council

PRESENTATION MADE
New Pastor Will Arrive Next Week and Organizer Leaves Soon Afterwards

The council of St. Paul's Lutheran Church held its regular monthly meeting last evening at the residence of K. E. Hallberg and at the close of the meeting, the last at which the organizer of the congregation, Rev. P. E. Baisler, will preside, the secretary, John Dybhavn spoke appreciatively of the able and thorough work done by the pastor, in laying the foundation of St. Paul's congregation. Many obstacles had to be overcome but the growing fruitfulness of the work would be some reward for the sacrifices made. He personally thought that all the members of the council had benefited by their association with Mr. Baisler and the work of the council. As a small token of appreciation he presented the retiring pastor with a leather portfolio on behalf of the council.

Feeling Response
Mr. Baisler feelingly responded. He said that one of the most difficult things in his work was to break away from the good friends made in Prince Rupert. He had stated outside as well as here that the council of St. Paul's church was one of the best. He had worked with in the organization of mission congregations. He predicted one of the very best of missions in the Pacific synod which would develop into a self-supporting congregation in the not far distant future.

Mr. Baisler will be leaving Prince Rupert in about two weeks from now. He will be here to meet Rev. T. D. Rinde, the first regular pastor of the congregation, who is expected next week and will induct him the following Sunday.

BOBBING MORE HEADS TODAY

Hairdressers See No Slackening in Present Styles or Tendency to Revert

MAJORITY MIDDLE AGED

Those Who Used to Scoff Have Come into Modern Fashion: Girls Unanimous

TORONTO, March 3. — The bob will remain. No edict of hairdresser or wig-maker or transformer can kill it, and no mere rumors of wars or scare headlines about "The Battle of the Bob" can weaken its hold on the world of women. Whether it is that couturiers of Paris are designing for the bobbed woman, or the coiffeurs are considering the needs of the sportswoman, the fact remains that the frank, comfort of the spring fashions will travel hand-in-hand with the freedom and lightness of the shingle. Today clothes and the bob make the woman.

Shorn Heads Increasing
In spite of predictions of a battle at the coming convention of hairdressers in New York on March 8 and 9, local experts see no cause for anxiety among the bobbed. "We are bobbing more heads now than we ever bobbed before," was the succinct statement of a prominent Yonge St. hairdresser. "Within the last ten days or two weeks we have 'cut' more heads than we cut in the previous four or five months. There is absolutely no sign of a falling off of interest in short hair. The majority of patrons seem to be middle-aged, and even elderly women. All the younger girls have been trimmed this long time, and now even the women who used to scoff are coming into the fashion."

Shingling Again
"A lot of women who went back to long hair for a while are coming for a shingle again. They'll have no more of long hair and hairpins, they say," he went on, "and probably, in view of approaching spring, they don't mind losing the extra warmth."

So, the general opinion is that the bob will be the reigning idea for spring. A tweed coat, a chic little felt or Bankok hat, and a trim bob—these are the requisites of a smart spring ensemble. There will be no radical change in the styles, according to local opinion. The bob will continue permanently ruled with waves, worn an natural in the day time and supplemented by curled postiches or coronet braids for formal evening wear.

Boysish Bob a Freak
As for the boysish bob, its days are numbered. "It's a freak," say the experts, speaking as with authority. "It's a case of taking a perfectly nice, sensible style and going too far with it. A neat, close shingle is one thing, but a flat, brillantined boy's cut is decidedly another. In my own business, I don't think I have ever had a repeat for a boysish bob. The girls try it out once, and then realize that it is too masculine and let their hair grow until it can be properly cut. I have some 75 or 80 girls altogether in my school and shops, and though every last one of them is bobbed, only two have the boysish bob, and they are sorry for it. That's a pretty good criterion of hair fashions, I should say."
