

## CROP REPORT SHOWS GRAIN GOES IN WELL

**Soil Drifting Took Place on Prairies but on Whole Conditions are Favorable**

The present week should see wheat seeding in the prairie provinces practically completed, with some increase in the acreage, as compared with last year, says the Bank of Montreal crop report. The seed bed generally is in good condition but many districts report soil drifting, owing to the lack of surface moisture. In Ontario the season is three weeks later than last year and but little cultivating has been done. In Quebec and the maritime provinces the season is also late and cultivation has not commenced. In British Columbia on the other hand, the season is from two to four weeks earlier than usual and spring work is well advanced.

### Alberta

In Alberta soil conditions are generally satisfactory with ample moisture for germination. Wheat acreage will probably show a ten per cent increase. High winds prevalent recently may cause some re-seeding.

In the western area wheat seeding is 60 to 90 per cent completed in the northern portion and 40 to 60 per cent in the southern portion. Sugar beet acreage is 10 to 50 per cent completed and conditions are favorable. In the southwestern area moisture is needed.

### Saskatchewan

The surface soil in Saskatchewan is dry in places, but there is no immediate lack of moisture. Conditions are generally favorable. There is about five per cent increase in the wheat acreage.

In the northern area wheat seeding is general and about 50 per cent completed. There is ample moisture and the seed beds are in good condition. In the southern area 75 per cent of the wheat is sown. Although there have been high winds and some soil has been drifting, little damage is reported.

### Manitoba

In Manitoba wheat seeding is practically completed in the south with 70 to 80 per cent in the centre and well under way in the northern portion. Soil drifting has been general and rain would be welcome although the subsoil is satisfactory.

### British Columbia

Following a mild winter in British Columbia, the season is from two to four weeks earlier than usual. Seeding of grain is well advanced and hay in excellent condition. Grasshoppers are causing anxiety in the interior. A good acreage of potatoes is being planted. All tree fruits give promise of a heavy yield. Small fruits will probably be below the average. There is a large increase in the acreage planted to tomatoes. Hops are making excellent showing. Pasturage is fair to excellent. The spring has been unusually dry.

Holding specially constructed brushes between her teeth, Miss Yoneko Yamaguchi, the armless artist, had for several years painted obi, the decoration sash worn by all Japanese women. Some of her work at the exhibit sold for as much as \$500. Miss Yamaguchi was to have been a geisha girl. After she had learned the samisen and the graceful dance which pleases the Japanese tired business man, one night her father suddenly became insane, killed her five brothers and sisters and cut off her arms.

Her geisha career was finished so she began to make her teeth do the work of the missing fingers. It was not long before
