Great Britain's Industrial Efficiency.

A great deal has been said, especially by American writers, about the industrial supremacy of United States over all nations of the world. Here is what the Winnipeg Free Press says in defence of Great Britain on the subject:

"The striving for greater efficiency in production has been a marked feature of British industrial life since the war. The employers were forced to study it by the intense competition in international commerce. And the workers have been interested, also, because they know that with a more efficient system! of production they stand to receive a better return. 

FILM CENSORSHIP URGED IN GENEVA

GENEVA, April 7 .-- A movement to protect children throughout the world from undesirable moving pictures has been initiated by the League of Nations Advisory Commission on Child Welfare, which adopted a resolution for the creation of Central Censorship Boards in each country, composed of educationists and parents.

The resolution stipulates that these boards should prohibit the presentation of films demoralizing to the mentality and morality of children, and encourage films which develop the education of a child. It further recommends an international entente between the National Boards, with a view to international interdiction of undesirable pictures.

National legislation is favored to insure proper ventilation of moving-picture houses, with ample exits, and the prevention of the exhibition of inflammable films.
