The Cesarewitch Stakes has been run without interruption since 1893, whea it was established and named after the then heir to the Russian throne. The course, ramed after the race, is a severe test of stamina, and on this account does not attract so many the three-year-olds, the younger horses concentrating on the Cambridgeshire, which is only half the distance. The monetary value of the race, far outweighted by its historic significance, is in the neighborhood of \$10,000, made up of stakes of 25 sovereigns each and 1,000 sovereigns added.



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
